

Service Department:

95-Gallon Tote (Rubbish Container) Reminders

- Village totes should only be used for refuse removal
- All refuse placed in your tote must be bagged, do not put unbagged garbage in the Village tote containers
- Any excess refuse that will not fit in the new tote must be bagged and placed at the curb by the resident on Monday morning, no earlier than 5:00 a.m.
- If you have more refuse than is reasonable to carry to the curb, please call the Village Hall by Monday prior to 4:00 p.m. for a special pick-up.
- There will be no changes regarding recycling
- If you would like to dispose of your <u>old</u> containers, please call the Service Department
- Yard waste must be placed in separate trash bags. Yard waste should not be placed in your Village 95-gallon tote container.
- Do not place your name, address, or anything else on the container.
- Each container is linked to each address by a serial number. If you would like to purchase an additional container, please contact the Service Department. The price is currently \$50.00.
- The tote containers remain the property of the Village of Cuyahoga Heights and should not be intentionally, defaced, altered or damaged.
- Should you have recently purchased a new trash can, tote, or container, please
 contact the Service Director to exchange your container for a second Village
 owned tote at no additional charge.
- Our pick-up date and procedures remain the same. Garbage collection is Monday morning with the exception of weeks when Monday is a holiday. Trash pick-up will occur on Tuesday in this event.



Fire Department:

Safety Town

Go Green/Beutification Committee:

This month's tip: Storm water management and costs to you!
Rapid storm water runoff is a result of commercial and residential development, paving, flood plain landfills, loss of wetlands and loss of absorbent forest cover. Such conditions have contributed to occasional flooding in the Cuyahoga River valley and have resulted in financial losses. The high waters of a recent flood even threatened the Northeast Ohio Regional Sewer District (NEORSD) outfall. Flooding of this treatment facility would result in millions of gallons of raw sewage entering the river and Lake Erie.

To alleviate these conditions, NEORSD is creating massive underground storage facilities which catch both sanitary and storm sewer waters for storage and later treatment. The recently completed Mill Creek Tunnel resides beneath our community of Cuyahoga Heights and the Mill Creek valley. Waste water is stored in this cavernous excavation until there is available capacity at the treatment plant. Other such underground countywide storage facilities are planned.

In order to finance similar flood control projects, the NEORSD has implemented a plan to assess each industrial and residential property based upon the properties impervious surface, and its resultant contribution to storm water runoff. An average-size home would pay about \$57.00 per year. However, if a rain barrel is installed to collect downspout rainfall, a \$14.00 credit would be applied to reduce the annual charge. Those residents qualifying for the Homestead Exemption will be charged at the lower rate of \$1.95/month. Collected water could be used for watering lawns and gardens, or washing a car. In addition to financing the underground storage facilities, monies would be made available for the restoration of wetlands and stream bank stabilization in order to reduce and slow storm water runoff.

A recent court decision has ruled in favor of the NEORSD storm water plan, but it has since been appealed. A final decision on this appeal should be forthcoming in 2012.

Go Green Update:

In the May 1, 2012 Cuyahoga Heights Newsletter Go Green article regarding the installation of bat houses in Bacci park, it was reported that the Fish and Wildlife Service estimated that the number of bats that had died from whitenose syndrome to be 1.0-1.5 million animals. It has since updated the number of fatalities to 7.0 million bats.

Newspaper & Cardboard Recycling Reminder

Our Village has a recycling container at our Service Department for cardboard and newspapers. Please drop off your cardboard and newspapers anytime. If you have a large amount of cardboard or newspapers and are unable to take it to the container, please call the Village Hall during business hours prior to Tuesday mornings; we will put it on our "special pick up" list.
