- received notification on May 3 from The Ohio Public Works Commission that our request for financial assistance in the form of a grant/loan had been approved for the Harvard Avenue Repair and Resurfacing project in the amount of \$400,000. We are very excited and anxious to move forward on this; an agreement will be released on behalf of the Commission by July 1, 2012.
- the Village, along with Silverlode, are working with the Cuyahoga County Planning Commission discussing emergency funding for our service garage's HVAC system replacement; we have submitted the application and are awaiting their response.
- thank you to our employees and residents who attended the George Murray F.O.P. Lodge's annual Memorial Parade in paying tribute to our fallen police officers on Monday, May 7.

# Mayor's Office (Continued)

- Village Engineer Todd Sciano has been diligently working with our Nicky Boulevard issues and reported that in order to continue to partner with the regulatory agencies, during the pursuit of the Village of Cuyahoga Heights' Beneficial Use and Redevelopment Master Plan for Nicky Boulevard, Boyas Contributions, LLC is completing some required maintenance and housekeeping issues surrounding the property. As a follow up to the Village's meeting with OEPA to discuss the master plan vision, the OEPA had scheduled a site inspection with all regulatory departments to review the status of the site. As a result of that inspection Boyas Contributions, LLC is completing the required housekeeping items outlined in their site inspection. These short term repairs are instrumental in paving the way for the Village to work towards their Large Scale Master Plan Vision and the Public & Private Partnership between Boyas Contributions, LLC and the Ohio EPA Solid Waste & Surface Water Divisions, Cuyahoga County Board of Health, Army Corps of Engineers and the Village of Cuyahoga Heights to achieve our goals or beneficial use and redevelopment of the Nicky Boulevard Landfill. Our administration is vigilantly working on a Master Plan that will solve many issues, if not all, as it relates to this closed landfill ultimately leaving 20+ acres of redevelopment ready property. Additionally, we have submitted two applications, a Master Plan Grant and a Bacci Park ADA Compliant Bathroom Grant; awards should be announced early in the summer. We look forward to unveiling a complete understanding of this project in the near future.
- on May 16, myself, Clerk Unger and Councilmembers Bloam, Contipelli and Duszynski attended the Cuyahoga Valley Chamber of Commerce's State of the School luncheon at the Holiday Inn; Superintendent Dr. Holland was one of the key speakers.

Dear Residents,

We are financially sound. We are not spending extravagantly, nor are we hoarding money for a rainy day. In my opinion, we are spending what we need to spend in order to keep up the maintenance of the Village, supply the departments with needed equipment, continue to offer the many services to the residents that we have always provided, while staying within the Mayor's budget.

According to the RITA chart, our tax revenue continues to increase. We know that Alcoa has moved more of their managerial employees back to Cuyahoga Heights, and the tax revenue from the other steel mills is slowly increasing. To date, we are \$188,564.12 ahead of last year's tax revenue for the same period.

We started the year with \$2,259,156.99 in the General Fund, and as of the end of May, it is at \$2,573,692.14. This number will fluctuate throughout the year, but it needs to continually increase in order to pay some large transfers that will come at the end of the year, such as the \$500,000 payment for the Police station debt, \$175,000 payment for the Police Pension, and \$275,000 for the Fire Pensions. These are transfers that were in the budget, and are taken from the General Fund.

Financially we are solid, and we are working hard to make the best decisions for our Village. If you ever have any questions or concerns, my door is always open.

# Outdoor Grills and Barbecues Message from Ohio Fire Marshall Larry Flowers

"Grills accounted for 82 fires and four injuries in Ohio last year," said Fire Marshal Flowers. "Grilling out is a favorite pastime. With some simple precautions, Ohioans will be able to make happy memories with friends and family this summer."

Over half of all outdoor grill fires occur between the months of May and August. In addition, outdoor grill fires are estimated to cause approximately 10 deaths, 100 injuries and \$37 million in property damage nationwide, according to the United States Fire Administration.

Ohio State Fire Marshal Flowers provides these important Barbecue/Grill safety tips:

- \*All propane and charcoal barbecue grills must be used outdoors to avoid fire hazards and toxic gases such as carbon monoxide.
- \*Keep grills clear from overhanging branches, house siding and deck edges and railings. Also position the grill far from foot traffic.
- \*Before using a gas grill, check the connection between the propane tank and the fuel line.
- \*Wear well-fitted clothing when barbecuing. Loose articles and flammable material such as nylon should be avoided.
- \*Be careful when using lighter fluid. Do not add fluid to an already lit fire the flame can flashback into the container and explode.
- \*Supervise children around outdoor grills. Announcing a three-foot 'safety zone' around the grill is an effective way to keep both children and pets at a distance.
- \*Keep all matches and lighters away from children. Teach your children to report any loose matches or lighters to an adult immediately.
- \*Dispose of hot coals properly douse all of them, not just the red ones, with plenty of water and stir them to ensure that the fire is out. **Never** place them in plastic, paper or wooden containers.

Take the time to make sure everyone knows to 'Stop, Drop and Roll' in case an article of clothing catches fire. Outdoor activities such as grilling seem simple, but following the safety tips will ensure a safe and happy summer.

During the May, 2012 council meeting Ordinance 2012-38 and 2012-39 were passed. Below is a brief outline of changes/additions. For a complete copy please contact the Building Department.

#### 2012-38

Amending section 1490.11 of the Codified Ordinance...

(d) Driveways shall be maintained so as not to constitute a blighting or deteriorating effect in the neighborhood.

#### 2012-39

Amending section 1490.08 of the Codified Ordinance...

(c) All dwellings shall display the property address on the house, excluding placement on garage doors, with numbers visible from the street. The numbers shall be at least three inches in height and be of an easily readable font.

### Composting

There are many ways to construct a compost bin; although an open pile would certainly suffice. Four wooden pallets mounted on edge and joined together at the corners, a section of snow fencing or chicken wire formed into a circle and staked to the ground will also work. The bin should be of such size and construction as to permit easy access for periodic turning of the contents.

The bin size should be approximately three feet in height, three feet in length and three feet in width. This volume is the minimum volume at which a pile becomes self-insulating to retain its heat. Constructing a pile higher or wider than five feet slows the composting process as it reduces oxygen in the pile and requires more frequent turning.

Turning the pile aerates the compost for the beneficial bacteria, fungi and other decomposers to do their work. Turning with a shovel or pitch fork also brings less decomposed portions of the pile into the center where the high heat decomposers will go to work. Earth worms, sow bugs, pill bugs, centipedes, mites, and ground beetles help in the decomposition process. The mulch should be kept moist; but too much water can slow the decomposition process and make the mulch smelly and slimy. Cover the mulch with a tarp should excess rainfall be a problem. Don't squash the material down to make more space, as that will prevent air from entering.

A good practice is to screen the compost through a ½ inchmesh screen and return the unfinished material to the bin for further decomposition.

Pure leaf compost tends to be acidic so lime should be added to neutralize the finished product. Compost can be used as mulch or worked into the soil to improve its structure. If used as mulch, it should be applied to a depth of two or three inches.

Adding kitchen waste such as vegetables may attract critters, so bury such additions under leaves or grass clippings. Place the bin well away from building and outdoor areas where you entertain.


