I personally want to thank veterans Ralph Faragone, Raymond Rutkowski, and Richard Wallace for marching in the parade; Frank Trusso, Jr., for marching with Pack 28; Fire Chief Neal Cash who marched with his department, and to Howard Combs, Jr., for all his help that morning in setting up and preparing for our picnic after the ceremony.

I also wanted to recognize our oldest, life-long resident and veteran Mr. Hank Nobili; he served in World War II and landed Normandy Beach on D Day. We were recently informed that every property owner that resides in their own property is due a 2.5% reduction on their property tax bill and **homeowners must make application for this reduction.** This reduction is often taken care of at time of transfer of real estate. To receive the 2.5% homestead tax reduction, you must own and occupy your home as your principal place of residence (domicile) on January 1 of the year you file for the reduction. A homeowner and spouse are entitled to this homestead tax reduction on only one home in Ohio. For your convenience, we have attached a copy of the required form within this newsletter. From the Clerk:

I wanted to take this opportunity to try and explain how important our General Fund is, and where the money comes from that supports this Fund.

We have many different Funds, the largest being the General Fund. The State mandates that we use the General Fund to pay our everyday bills and employee salaries. It is the largest Fund, and our goal is to have approximately 2 million dollars in this Fund at the end of the year, after all of our bills are paid.

Our RITA revenue supplies the General Fund, and makes up 86% of the money that supplies this fund. That is why our RITA taxes are so important, and that is why I put the RITA chart in the newsletter. Our RITA revenue can go up or down from year to year. Generally, if it goes down, that means there are fewer jobs, and people are getting laid off. If our RITA revenue rises, that means more jobs are being created, and the economy is doing better.

As you can see in the RITA chart, in 2010, our RITA revenue was 6.7 million, in 2011 it was 7.1 million, and in 2012, it was 7.5 million. We expect a minor increase again this year, based on projections from the major companies located in the Village, the expert opinion of the people working at RITA, and the projections of this Administration.

We make these projections at the beginning of the year, and that is the money we will use to make the budget and pass the appropriation Ordinance. It is a very difficult task, but so far we have been very accurate. And again we are on track to make 2013 a successful year. We are financially secure, and working hard to keep our Village sustainable far into the future.


Village Hall:

From the Police:

Cyber/Internet Safety Tips

Here are some signs that your child might be at risk online

- Your child spends large amounts of time online, especially at night.
- You find pornography on your child's computer.
- Your child receives phone calls from people you don't know or making calls, sometimes long distance, to numbers you don't recognize.
- Your child receives mail, gifts, or packages from someone you don't know.
- Your child turns the computer off or quickly changes the screen when you come in the room.
- Your child becomes withdrawn from the family.
- Your child is using an online account belonging to someone else.
- Surveys indicate the internet poses serious risks for youth online ages 10-17:
- One in seven has received a sexual solicitation or approach over the internet.
- One in three has had unwanted exposure to sexual material-pictures of naked people or people having sex.
- One in 25 has received an aggressive sexual solicitation, someone asking to meet somewhere, calling on the phone or sending offline mail, money or gifts.

Here are some tips that will help keep your child safe when using the internet

- Make sure your child does not spend all of their time on the computer.
 People, not computers, should be their best friends and companions.
- Keep the computer or laptop in an area where it can be monitored, like the family room, kitchen or living room, not in your child's bedroom.
- Learn enough about computer's so you can enjoy them with your kids. If you have to search for something for work or have an interest for information on the internet, ask your kids for help. Have them show you the best way to locate them.
- Teach them never to meet an online friend in person. Children and teens can be very trusting and don't think there are people in this world that would harm them.
- Watch your children when they are online and see where they go. You may see them going to sites that are not appropriate for them. You can talk to them and explain why these sites are not appropriate. Take advantage of contact controls. Many software and internet service providers offer technology that help block inappropriate sites. They can also gain access by using smart phones, along with many other devices.
- Make sure that your children feel comfortable coming to you with questions and don't over react if things go wrong. Communication is the key and your children have to know they can come to you with any problems.



From the Police (cont.):

- Keep your child out of chat rooms or internet relay chat channels unless they are monitored. Make sure they don't reply to any messages or bulletin board items that are suggestive, obscene, aggressive, or distressing.
- ♦ Teach them what information they can share online and what they can't (like telephone numbers, address, their full name and what school they go to or photographs). No information about your child should be given out over the internet.
- Understand social networking trends. Popular sites such as Facebook are popular with young people, but have become hunting grounds for internet predators. Never let your child have an open, public page that anyone can go on.

If you think your child may have a problem with using the internet or an online predator please give the Cuyahoga Heights Police Department a call. We will have our juvenile officer contact you as soon as possible. We will use all of our resources; if we cannot find the answer we will assist you with other resources that are available.
