On October 11, our administration will be hosting the annual fall luncheon for the businesses in our community. Mr. Jack Schron, Jr., President of Jergens, Inc., and District 6 Cuyahoga County Council member has graciously volunteered his time to be our key note speaker that afternoon.

ArcelorMittal is doing maintenance repair work to one of their two blast furnaces with an investment of \$55 million. The last time major work had been done to the furnace was back in 1989. They are also celebrating their 100th anniversary!

And finally, we are well under way in planning our third annual Corn Roast on Saturday, October 19. We hope that many of our residents will join us during this special event – sip on warm cider, munch on corn, listen to music and meet new friends....stay tuned.

Please don't mind our dust - projects around town...

The **Village Hall Exterior Renovation Project** is progressing more rapidly than anticipated since the weather is cooperating, and completion of grinding out mortar joints will finish up shortly. Mortar *(tuck-pointing)* is to follow along with painting and entrance repairs. Soon we will see an aesthetically beautiful building with much needed work and a fresh appearance.

The **Village-wide Sidewalk Repair and Replacement Project** is well under way. Earlier this month construction began on replacing the concrete walks on Bletch & Marcelline Courts, East 72nd Place, and Willowbrook Drive. East 49th Street and Grant Avenue construction began shortly after. The sidewalks on East 71st Street will be repaired concurrently with the repair and resurfacing project.

The East 71st Street Repair and Resurfacing Improvement project began earlier this week and will focus on the residential area working from the I-77 cross over north to Chapek Parkway. We understand the inconvience of this project, however many factors contribute to the scheduling of these types of necessary improvements. The lengthy list of logistics include: engineering, financing, bidding, contracting, legislative approval, and finally scheduling of the project itself by the contractor. In addition, two traffic calming islands will be built to assist in slowing the transient motorists who travel through our residential district.

The Harvard Avenue Repair, Resurfacing, and Traffic Signal Improvements Project is well under construction. The existing concrete base turned out to be in much worse shape than anticipated leading to a delay in getting the first layer of asphalt installed. The concrete base repairs are complete and the intermediate layer of asphalt has been installed. Harvard Hill is also taking shape with its new lane configuration and pavement narrowing paving the way for the installation of a new concrete walk which will connect our Harvard Avenue businesses to the Cleveland Metroparks Trail. Over the next several weeks, the remaining structures will be adjusted to grade along with the installation of a new retaining wall. As we have noted in previous newsletters, our Village received a grant and a loan from Ohio Public Works to assist in completing the project. Harvard Avenue will be improved from the Newburgh Heights corporation line to the Harvard/Denison Bridge along with Harvard Hill to the Cuyahoga River. The Traffic Signal at Harvard/Denison Intersection will be the first signal improved with our new traffic signal upgrade program.

He retired after a 31 year career at the North East Ohio Regional Sewer District from 1980 through 2011 as well as serving as member of the Cuyahoga Heights Village Council from 2002-2005. I grew up with Ollie as a close neighbor and considered him to be like an

older brother. I have a million stories I could tell about growing up with Ollie, one of my fonder/foolish memories is recalled daily as I look at the scar on my left hand; the result of Ollie's BB gun... as I recall, Ollie was practicing his aim on some pop cans in the back yard and the aforementioned scar is the result of my disbelief that anything was coming from the gun (because he wasn't hitting any of the cans). The next time Ollie pulled the trigger, I decided to place my hand in front of the barrel, much to my surprise, I learned the hard way that bb's were actually being fired (just because you can't see it, doesn't mean it's not there). I ended up having two BB's removed from my hand and Ollie ended up getting a whipping he never deserved from his pop. From the Clerk:

After going through three quarters of the year, we are on track financially to finish the year with paying all of our bills, and having a reserve in the bank for emergencies. We are in solid financial shape moving into the last quarter.

This Administration has made a commitment to making our Village a great place to live by investing in projects that will benefit all of us, while staying within our means. As you can see, the projects have started, and most will be completed before the end of the year.

Financially, we went to the bond market to get the money to pay for these projects, and we sold the note for 1%, a great interest rate that is manageable to fit into our budget at this time. With all the needed work that we are doing in the Village, we will secure our buildings and roads for a long time.

Periodically, I talk about revenue and how it has affected our Village. I want to try to explain why we have had to make tough financial choices based on our decreasing revenue.

Cuyahoga Heights has always had enough money to do whatever we wanted until the downturn of 2008, when our 2009 yearly revenue in our General Fund dropped by almost 1.5 million dollars from 2008. Our revenue for 2012 was still 1 million dollars less in our General Fund than in 2008.

Most of our revenue is derived from withholding taxes from people working in our Village. The more jobs we have, the more revenue we get. Most of our RITA revenue is derived from withholding taxes from people working in our Village, and that is why I attach the RITA chart. If our RITA revenue goes up, we can assume it is because more companies have hired more employees, and the economy is getting better.

Next month, I will try to explain what our future revenue looks like for our Village, and if the economy is truly getting better.

Police Department:

Passing on the right violation- E.71st Street

Yellow lines separate traffic going opposite directions and white lines separates lanes of traffic traveling the same direction. This makes E. 71st a designated one lane highway on each side of the yellow center lines.

In an effort to maintain safe travel on E. 71st Street, passing on the right is prohibited. We will look at each traffic stop on a case by case basis and if warranted under Cuyahoga Heights Cod. Ord. 432.04, then a citation will be issued.

Make your children eat dinner before setting out Children should carry a cell phone so they can call home An adult should accompany children, of any age Make sure all costumes are made of flame-retardant material Always test make-up in small area first. Remove it before bedtime to avoid skin/eye irritation Make sure you know where they are going Tell children to bring candy home to be inspected

Safety Tips for Homeowners

Make sure your house is well lit

Make sure your yard is clear of anything that can trip children Put pets away to protect them from cars or inadvertently biting a trick-or-treater (Your pets get scared too) Battery powered jack o'lantern candles are preferable If you use candles place pumpkins well away from where trick-or-treaters will be walking or standing

Safety Tips for Trick-or-Treaters Carry a flashlight or glow stick Walk; don't run. Stay on sidewalks. Obey traffic signals Never walk near lit candles or luminaries. Stay in familiar neighborhoods Make sure costumes don't drag on the ground Make sure shoes fit Wear clothing with reflective markings or tapes Only go to houses that have a light on Never go into someone's home Stay away from and don't pet animals (you may scare them). Stay away from unfamiliar cars or people Swords, knives, etc., should be short, soft and flexible Don't eat any candy until your parents have inspected it Never go up to a house alone; stay in a group

Fall Round Up

It's that time again of the year! Clean out your sheds, garages and basements. Materials accepted are oil or solvent-based paints, sealers, primers, coatings, varnishes, polyurethanes, shellacs, spray paint, paint thinner, mineral spirits, turpentine, pesticides such as bug and rodent killers, weed killers, mold killers, caustic household cleaners, automotive products, tar and driveway sealers, motor oil, mercury, kerosene and gasoline. Dispatch:

Severe Thunderstorm information

Before a Severe Thunderstorm:

Have an emergency kit and family plan made. Remove dead or rotting trees and branches that could fall and cause injury or damage during a severe thunderstorm.

Secure outdoor objects that could blow away or cause damage. Make sure window and doors are secured, close blinds, shades or curtains. Unplug any electronic equipment, before the storm arrives, power surges from lightning can cause serious damage.

During the Storm:

Use your battery operated radio to listen for storm updates. Avoid contact with corded phones and devices including those plugged into electric for recharging. Cordless and wireless phone not connected to wall outlets are ok to use.

After a Severe Thunderstorm:

Never drive through a flooded roadway. "Turn Around, Don't Drown" Stay away from storm damaged areas to keep from putting yourself at risk. Listen to your radio for updated information or instructions, as access to roads may be blocked.
