

2015 CUYAHOGA HEIGHTS VILLAGE SCHOLARSHIP PROGRAM

Again this year, Council has passed legislation for a Village Scholarship to assist Cuyahoga Heights graduating seniors with their future college tuition. Recipients will be awarded a \$500.00 scholarship in the form of a tuition reimbursement.

To be eligible, the recipient must:

- 1) Be a resident of Cuyahoga Heights
- 2) Be a graduating high school senior in the spring or summer of 2015
- 3) Be enrolled either full or part time at an accredited college, university, community college, vocational or technical school for the fall of 2015
- 4) Complete the fall 2015 term with a grade point average sufficient to be in good standing

Applications are available at the High School Guidance Office or at the Village Hall and must be submitted to Clerk Unger's office by May 1, 2015. Our administration encourages and promotes higher education for all of our students and is proud to continue the Village Scholarship tradition to help our graduating seniors.

From the Clerk:



When we closed the books on 2014 and reconciled our bank accounts, it gave us the money that is actually in each fund to begin 2015. We then add our estimated revenue for 2015 and it gives us a total for each fund that we can spend for 2015.

When we started to develop the budget for 2015, we estimated that our RITA revenue would be up approximately \$150,000.00 from 2014. We are certainly on track to hit that number, but remain watchful in case of any sharp change.

Looking at the RITA chart below you can see that we have collected almost \$100,000.00 more in the first three months than we did during the first three months of last year. We are off to a great start in tax collections but we need to remain cautious in case we see a downturn in the business section of the economy towards the last half of 2015.

In Cuyahoga Heights, our revenue is dictated by the amount of jobs in our community. We don't have a large property tax base and we are getting less and less help at the State and Federal level. We adjusted to the downturn of 2008 and made it through with over a million dollars in the bank for emergencies. We watch our budget diligently and make sure we are secure.

Today, our finances are stable and as of the end of March, we had over \$1.5 million in our General Fund. We are good stewards of our money and continue to make Cuyahoga Heights a great place to live.

Service Department:

Hazardous Waste Round-Up: This is a year round program – please call the Village Hall if you have hazardous waste that needs to be picked up.

Friendly Reminder:

All trash must be placed in garbage bags prior to disposing of in the Village issued trash cans. <u>In addition, dog litter must be bagged before placing in the trash can</u>. Your cooperation is appreciated.

Recycle Your Computer Month: The Cuyahoga Heights Service Department will pick up your unwanted equipment on Tuesdays in April. All you need to do is call the Village Hall at 641-7020 by Monday to be put on the special pick up list for Tuesday. Acceptable home computer equipment includes CPU's, monitors, keyboards, mice, printers, terminals, modems, cables, software, and ink printer cartridges. Cell phones and their accessories are also accepted.

Service Department (continued):



Yard Waste: Yard waste (i.e., grass clippings, tree branches, leaves, etc.) must be put in bags or separate trash cans, not in the 95 gallon Village issued grey trash cans or blue recycling cans.

Senior Grass Cutting

"Spring Time" is right around the corner and once again the Cuyahoga Heights Service Department will be cutting grass free of charge for our Senior Citizens and disabled persons who qualify according to the Ordinance:

- (a) Registrant must be sixty (60) years of age or older and must reside alone or with a spouse of like age or older, or the registrant must be disabled and not have an able-bodied person living with him or her who is under sixty (60) years of age. "Disabled" means physical or mental impairment that substantially limits one or more major life activities, including, but not limited to, the functions of caring for one's self, performing manual tasks, walking, seeing, breathing, learning, and working.
- (b) The property registered must be a single-family dwelling, a two-family dwelling, or a multiple family dwelling and the owner of the property must reside at the registered property.
- (c) Registrant must execute a consent and release, in a form approved by the Solicitor, granting permission to the Village to provide the grass cutting service and releasing the Village, its servants, agents and employees from any liability arising out of the cutting of grass on the registrant's property.


Please note that our Village is not responsible for grass length, the grass cutters are set at a standard height and will not be changed. If you have a dog, please clean the area of dog waste so we can cut the yard properly. *If you have already registered in the past, then you need not re-register.* We ask that applicants be patient with this service, as the program will start up at the end of April.

Tree Trimming: Each residential property is able to receive one (1) tree removal and up to two (2) trims per calendar year. Each property owner must sign a "Waiver of Liability & Right of Entry" form before having this service. Applications for this program are available at the Village Hall during normal business hours, or you may download the application from our web site under the "Service Department."

Tree Lawns: Tree lawns in the Village will **not** be cut by our Service Department personnel, except for those tree lawns for the seniors/disabled residents that qualify with the grass cutting program. As always, we thank you for your continued cooperation.

Rototilling: The Service Department will begin rototilling residential gardens during May (weather permitting.) Garden areas must be marked clearly. Please call the Village Hall during normal business hours to schedule this service.

Park Patrol: Park Patrol will begin at the end of April.



Police Department:



With the thawing ground, melting snow, and spring showers it is also prime time for flooding. Remember that it is better to *Turn Around – Don't Drown*.

- Do not walk or drive through a flooded area.
- Six inches of moving water can knock you off your feet and two feet of moving water can move a car.
- Do not drive around road barriers as the road or bridge may be washed out.



- Stay away from power lines and electrical wires. Electrical current can travel through water and can cause electrocution.
- If you are caught on a flooded road and waters are rising rapidly around you, get out of the car quickly and move to higher ground.

April is National Distracted Drivers Month

Distracted driving consistently ranks as one of the traffic safety issues at forefront of many drivers' thinking. Each year, more than 80% of drivers in the annual AAA Foundation Traffic Safety Culture Index cite distraction as a serious problem and a behavior that makes them feel less safe on the road. Nearly half of all people who say they feel less safe than they did five years ago say distracted driving by other drivers fuels their concerns. Distracted driving is a deadly behavior. Federal estimates suggest that distraction contributes to 16% of all fatal crashes, leading to around 5,000 deaths every year.

The AAA Foundation believes that by improving our understanding of how mental and physical distractions impair drivers and by educating the public about avoiding distractions, we can eliminate these needless deaths.

Our work in this area also focuses on how distraction affects specific groups. Teens are among the drivers most impaired by distraction. A recent AAA Foundation in-car study showed that teen drivers were distracted almost a quarter of the time they were behind the wheel. Electronic devices, such as texting, emails, and downloading music were among the biggest distractions, accounting for 7% of the distractions identified on the study video.

- •Distraction contributes to more than 5,000 traffic fatalities each year. Know the facts.
- •Texting and phone calls aren't the only distractions. Passengers, eating, and in-car technologies can also cause distractions.

- 6. Teach your children how and when to call 911
- 7. Prank calls to 911 are illegal in most states
- 8. If you do call 911 by mistake do not hang up

618.01 DOGS AND OTHER ANIMALS RUNNING AT LARGE; NUISANCE, DANGEROUS AND VICIOUS DOGS; HEARINGS.

No owner or keeper of a dog or any other domestic animal shall permit such animal to go upon the public parks, playfields, recreation areas, lands or roadways within the Village, unless such animal is securely leashed or otherwise tied and under the control of the owner or keeper thereof.

Remember to follow all traffic laws and be mindful of your surroundings. If you have any safety concerns, please feel free to contact the police department.

Building Department:

I would like to advise each homeowner that the Village of Cuyahoga Heights' Codified Ordinance Section requires the Building Department to review all exterior properties as herewith noted for property maintenance for the year 2015. All exterior properties/buildings for non-residential dwellings shall also be inspected as well during the months of April and May.

The object of the inspection is to indicate the code violations on properties in order to enhance our Village's image, as well as increasing and maintaining or current value on our homes.

The items that need to be repaired for each dwelling will be listed on each homeowner's report, if any, and are the observations made by our Building Department. We hope that each homeowner will rectify all items within a specific timeframe which also will be included on the report. Please be advised that if a homeowner fails to correct the problem in accordance with the guidelines set forth by the Building Department, a citation and/or penalty may be issued in compliance with the Codified Ordinances of the Village of Cuyahoga Heights.

Please remember that grant dollars are available through the Cuyahoga Heights Community Housing Maintenance Grant Program. The application, ordinance and instructions for the grant can be found on our web site at www.cuyahogaheights.com under the Building Department. In addition, our Ordinances can be found under the Legal Department on our web site.

Any <u>homeowner who owns rental property</u> in the Village of Cuyahoga Heights is required to have a Certificate of Occupancy each year prior to April 1. All out-of-county homeowners are also required to have a Certificate of Occupancy. Renters, please advise property owners of this requirement.
