From the Clerk:



We are moving into the last quarter of the year, and we are on track financially to finish the year with paying all of our bills and having a surplus of over a million dollars in our General Fund.

After three quarters of the year, we have spent 72% of our budgeted expenses, and we have received 84% of our expected revenue. These are good indications of finishing the year with a larger than expected balance in our General Fund.

We are committed to making our Village a great place to live by investing in projects that will benefit all of us, while staying within our means. The Village looks wonderful, and we should all be very proud.

The majority of our revenue is derived from people working in our Village. The more jobs we have, the more revenue we get. Most of our RITA revenue is derived from withholding taxes and that is why I attach the RITA chart. These numbers are a critical part of how we operate throughout the year. We rely heavily on this revenue stream.

According to the RITA chart, we have taken in \$143,000.00 more than this time last year. We will continue to monitor our expenses and revenue to make sure we end the year with a healthy balance in our General Fund.

General Election

Exercise your right to vote in the upcoming General Election on Tuesday, November 3, 2015. In addition to county wide issues, our Village Council Members are all up for re-election. Do your part as a citizen and vote. The polls will be open in the auditorium at the Cuyahoga Heights Village Hall from 6:30 a.m. until 7:30 p.m.



Voter Identification Requirements:

Voters must bring identification to the polls in order to verify identity. Identification may include:

- A current and valid photo identification card (e.g., driver's license or state ID)
- A military identification
- A copy of a current utility bill, bank statement, government check, paycheck, or other government document that shows the voter's name and current address.

Note: You cannot use as proof of identification a notice that the board of elections mailed to you. Voters who do not provide one of these documents will still be able to vote by provisional ballot. Voters who do not have any of the above forms of identification, including a social security number, will still be able to vote by signing an affirmation swearing to the voter's identity under penalty of election falsification and by casting a provisional ballot.

Building Department:

Winter season is approaching fast. With that in mind, most dwelling fires occure during the winter season. The majority of these fires occur at night between the hours of 11:00 p.m. and 6:00 a.m.

Please check all of your smoke detectors to make sure they are operating properly. Smoke detectors must be installed on all levels of your home. All bedrooms and hallways should have smoke detectors installed in them.

- Change batteries twice a year
- Alarms more than 10 years old should be replaced
- Periodically, every four to eight weeks, test all smoke alarms

Working smoke detectors save lives.

Heritage Home Program

Much can be said about a community by its housing stock and we all should take pride in Cuyahoga Heights. Our Village has wonderful homes worthy of maintaining and enhancing. To aid homeowners in doing this, our community has participated in the Heritage Home ProgramSM of the Cleveland Restoration Society (CRS) for the past several years. This is a wonderful service that is available to you – **free of charge**!

For owners of houses over 50 years old, the Heritage Home ProgramSM provides free technical assistance for home repair and maintenance projects such as:

- Site visit to the property to assess projects and provide feedback
- Advice on kitchen and bathroom makeovers
- Advice on repair and maintenance issues
- Advice on compatible additions
- Assistance finding contractors
- Evaluation of contractor estimates
- Impartial product and service reviews
- Color consultations for exterior painting

In addition to providing technical assistance, the Heritage Home ProgramSM offers low, fixed-interest loans for home improvement projects with current rates as low as 1.85% for 10 years. Most projects, interior and exterior, can qualify for this equity-based financing option.

Police Department:



With Halloween right around the corner your safety and the safety of our children is our top concern. **Trick or Treat, October 31st 6 p.m. to 7:30 p.m.** Officers will be out as in recent years on foot and in cars. If you see ANY suspicious, criminal, or dangerous activity please stop one of the officers and let them know or call 911.

- Swords, knives, and similar costume accessories should be short, soft, and flexible.
- A Avoid trick-or-treating alone. Walk in groups or with a trusted adult.
- Fasten reflective tape to costumes and bags to help drivers see you.
- Examine all treats for choking hazards and tampering before eating them. Limit the amount of treats you eat.
- Hold a flashlight while trick-or-treating to help you see and others see you. Always WALK and don't run from house to house.
- A Always test make-up in a small area first. Remove it before bedtime to prevent possible skin and eye irritation.
- Look both ways before crossing the street. Use established crosswalks wherever possible.
- L Lower your risk for serious eye injury by not wearing decorative contact lenses.
- Only walk on sidewalks whenever possible, or on the far edge of the road facing traffic to stay safe.
- W Wear well-fitting masks, costumes, and shoes to avoid blocked vision, trips, and falls.
- **E** Eat only factory-wrapped treats. Avoid eating homemade treats made by strangers.
- Enter homes only if you're with a trusted adult. Only visit well-lit houses. Don't stop at dark houses. Never accept rides from strangers.
- Never walk near lit candles or luminaries. Be sure to wear flame-resistant costumes.

Please take a look at the Halloween safety tip sheet (National Safety Council) that is included with this newsletter.

If you are driving please be extra cautious follow all traffic laws and parking signs. Remember to keep an eye out for little ghosts and goblins running around. Most importantly **DON'T DRINK AND DRIVE!**

Also as adults walking your children around, please remember the ordinance against walking around with open containers (including mugs filled with adult beverages)

Halloween Safety tips for Pets

1. Trick-or-treat candies are not for pets.

All forms of chocolate — especially baking or dark chocolate — can be dangerous for dogs and cats. Symptoms of **chocolate poisoning** may include vomiting, diarrhea, rapid breathing, increased heart rate, and seizures.

2. Keep pets confined and away from the door.

Not only will your door be constantly opening and closing on Halloween, but kids will be dressed in costumes and yelling loudly for their candy. Put your dog or cat in a secure room away from the front door.

3. Keep Halloween plants such as pumpkins and corn out of reach.

Although they are relatively nontoxic, such plants can make your pets stomach upset should your pets ingest them in large quantities.

4. Don't keep lit pumpkins around pets.

Should they get too close, they run the risk of burning themselves or knocking it over and causing a fire.

5. Don't dress your pet in a costume unless you know they'll love it.

It should not constrict movement, hearing, or the ability to breathe or bark and meow.

6. Make sure your pet has a name tag

If your dog or cat should escape and become lost, having the proper identification will increase the chances that they will be returned. Just make sure the information is up-to-date.

Special Pick Up

If you need a special pick up for trash that is oversized, large amounts, or hazardous waste, don't forget to call the Village Hall to be put on the Special Pick Up list. Special Pick Up day is on Tuesday mornings, unless there is a holiday on Monday, at which time, the Special Pick up will be taken care of on Wednesday. You must call the Village Hall by 4:00 on Monday to get on the list for Tuesday's pick up. Your assistance is appreciated.

Pet Waste

Please remember to pick up after your furry friends when walking them in the Village, especially on sidewalks and tree lawns.

Table and Chair Rental

Tables and chairs can be rented from the Service Department (limit of three (3) tables and 30 chairs). You must pick them up and bring them back to the garage. You will need to stop in at the Service Department and sign the loan form. Please be advised that tables and chairs are not permitted to leave the Village. If they are taken out of the Village, you will lose this privilege.

Yard Waste

Yard waste (i.e., grass clippings, tree branches, leaves, etc.) must be put in bags or separate trash cans, <u>not in the 95 gallon Village issued grey trash cans or blue recycling cans.</u>

Leaf Pick Up

Fall will be approaching us quickly and we would like to remind our residents to rake their leaves to the tree lawn; our Service Department will then dispose of them for you.

Snow Removal Program

Residential Snow Removal Program for our 2015/2016 season.

- All Village roadways will be plowed first and maintained prior to any driveways being plowed.
- Once the Service Director feels that the roadways and municipal buildings have been maintained, the driveways of our **senior citizens** will be plowed (using the same criteria that applies to our grass cutting service).
- Afterwards, taking into consideration manpower, time and safety issues the Village will **help** residents with their driveways in the event of a storm that produces more than 2-4 inches of snow at the resident's request.
- All residents must have driveway markers in place in order to allow the Service Department to plow their driveway. The Village will provide markers and place them for all seniors who qualify for the "grass cutting program." Residents with shorter driveways need 4 markers in place, and long driveways must have 6 markers. They need to be placed at the beginning, middle (if long drive), and at the end of your drive. If you wish to purchase markers from the Village for \$1 each, please stop at the Service Department. Should you have any questions please contact Service Director, Scott Waldemarson at 216-641-3505.
- Please note that residents are responsible for cleaning their driveway aprons, as it is difficult to plow them over again after the streets are plowed. Each homeowner and/or resident must have a waiver of liability on file at our Service Department. If you already have filled out a waiver of liability and there have been no changes to it, there will be no need to fill out a new one.
