From the Mayor:

It is with great sadness, that yet again we lost several residents. Clerk Robert Unger's younger brother Tom passed away on October 24; he was 57. Mrs. Bernice Blue passed away on November 16; she was 97. On behalf of our administration, elected officials, and staff, we would like to convey our deepest sympathies to the families.

Our business neighbors

Our administration recently wrote a letter to the Greater Cleveland Partnership in support of Alcoa and its request for Ohio grants. The facility on Harvard Avenue is upgrading its 35,000- and 15,000-ton presses; these grants will help retain and create new jobs at their facility.

Long-term economic development

I also wanted to update our residents, especially those on East 49th Street about the Nicky Boulevard Project. As many of you may know, our administration has been committed to working towards the future development of the Nicky Boulevard Landfill Brownfield Redevelopment Project and stabilization of the East 49th Street residential backyards — no matter how painful the process has been, there has been measurable progress made by our administration in 2015.

- The first portion of the leachate collection system had been installed by Boyas Excavating, Inc., earlier this year which allowed the Village to commence on the first portion of the environmental permitting.
- In August of 2015, Village Council engaged an environmental consultant to complete a wetland and stream delineation, and mitigation analysis of all of the properties associated within the project limits.
- Last month, the delineation report was submitted to the United States Army Corps of Engineers (USACE).
- Sometime this month, the USACE will be on site to conduct their review of the facility. Once we receive their concurrence, we will submit our application to the USACE and Ohio EPA for approval to move forward with the masterplan for the Nicky Boulevard landfill.

Our administration recognizes that the process is slow, and our residents have been very patient and understanding, but we want to assure you that we are committed to seeing this project through, and utilizing the brownfield redevelopment as an economic asset for the Village's future business solicitation.

Curaling the second

From the Clerk:

As we look towards the end of another year, our finances are very solid. We started the year with 1.4 million dollars in our General Fund, and I am projecting that we will end the year with 1.3 to 1.5 million dollars in our General Fund after paying all of our bills. At the beginning of the year I projected a 2% increase in RITA revenue. After booking all of the revenue from RITA taxes through November, I am projecting that the increase in this revenue stream will be very little, if any. These figures are directly related to the economy and jobs. Our economy is holding its own, but not growing at the rate we expected.

Our expenses are below what we budgeted for 2015. All the departments have watched their spending this year, and continue to monitor their budgets on a monthly basis. Moving into November, we have spent 78% of our budgeted expenses, and we are on track to finish the year under budget in most areas.

The Mayor, Council, and I have all worked very hard to make the right choices regarding the budget and spending while maintaining a surplus in the bank for emergencies. As the Clerk, I am very comfortable with our cash position, and will continue to work with the Mayor and Council to keep our Village financially solvent, and a great place to live.

Service Department:

Special Pick Up

If you need a special pick up for trash that is oversized, large amounts, or hazardous waste, don't forget to call the Village Hall to be put on the special pick up list. Special pick up day is on Tuesday mornings, unless there is a holiday on Monday, at which time, the special pick up will be taken care of on Wednesday. <u>You must call the Village Hall by</u> 4:00 on Monday to get on the list for Tuesday's pick up. Your assistance is appreciated.

Pet Waste

Please remember to pick up after your furry friends when walking them in the Village, especially on sidewalks and tree lawns.

Table and Chair Rental

Tables and chairs can be rented from the Service Department (limit of 3 tables and 30 chairs). You must pick them up and bring them back to the garage. You will need to stop in at the Service Department and sign the loan form. Please be advised that tables and chairs are not permitted to leave the Village. If they are taken out of the Village, you will lose this privilege.

Yard Waste

Yard waste (i.e., grass clippings, tree branches, leaves, etc.) must be put in bags or separate trash cans, **not in the 95 gallon Village issued grey trash cans or blue recycling cans**.

Snow Removal Program

Residential Snow Removal Program for our 2015/2016 season.

- All Village roadways will be plowed first and maintained prior to any driveways being plowed.
- Once the Service Director feels that the roadways and municipal buildings have been maintained, the driveways of our **senior citizens** will be plowed *(using the same criteria that applies to our grass cutting service).*
- Afterwards, taking into consideration manpower, time and safety issues the Village will **help** residents with their driveways in the event of a storm that produces more than 2-4 inches of snow at the resident's request.
- All residents must have driveway markers in place in order to allow the Service Department to plow their driveway. The Village will provide markers and place them for all seniors who qualify for the "grass cutting program." Residents with shorter driveways need 4 markers in place, and long driveways must have 6 markers. They need to be placed at the beginning, middle (if long drive), and at the end of your drive. If you wish to purchase markers from the Village for \$1 each, please stop at the Service Department. Should you have any questions please contact Service Director, Scott Waldemarson at 216-641-3505.
- Please note that residents are responsible for cleaning their driveway aprons, as it is difficult to plow them over again after the streets are plowed. Each homeowner and/or resident must have a waiver of liability on file at our Service Department. If you already have filled out a waiver of liability and there have been no changes to it, there will be no need to fill out a new one.



Police Department:

Be Alert for ID Theft This Holiday Season!

One of the most exciting things about the holiday season is shopping. Unfortunately, identity thieves love shopping, too, only they are shopping for ways to steal!

Please practice the following tips to help you avoid identity theft this holiday season. At the mall:

- Only bring your driver's license and the credit card you intend to use. Leave other credit cards and forms of ID at home.
- Watch for "shoulder surfers". Thieves will try to obtain information by taking a picture of your credit card or writing down the information as you make your transaction. Cover your information from prying eyes.
- Only use ATM's in secure locations with video surveillance and always shield your PIN number from others

Online:

- Make sure the website URL begins with **https**. The "s" indicates that you are on a secure web site.
- Be cautious of e-mails about the status of package deliveries to your home. Never open attachments from unknown sources.
- Don't shop or conduct personal business on un-secure networks, such as coffee shops, stores, restaurants, or public facilities.
- Use only known and reputable on-line merchants.
- Be sure your passwords and PINs are strong, unique, and difficult to detect. The best combine upper and lowercase letters combined with numbers and symbols.

General Shopping Tips:

- Use credit cards instead of debit cards. Thieves can drain your bank account if they obtain your information. Also, credit cards typically allow for a longer period for reporting fraud.
- Do not leave your wallet or smart electronic devices in view in your vehicle.
- Look for signs of ID theft by reviewing accounts for inaccuracies, receiving cards you did not apply for, and for being denied credit when you have always have had good credit.
- If you call tech support, be certain you have reached the actual company. Identity thieves have will use false support sites to obtain personal information.
