Remembering Irma

Growing up as a young man in Cuyahoga Heights, to me, Mr. & Mrs. Schab were the parents of Lee Ann and Stanley. As I got older, Mrs. Schab, “the parent” became a co-worker of mine when I was a police officer. Many of you may know, she was the charwoman for the Cuyahoga Heights Police Department. She left the Police Department and went into the grandma role – for her grandson Michael (*Lee Ann’s son*), her pride and joy. I was reunited yet again with her as a colleague and mentor when I was elected to Mayor; Irma served on council my first term, and having Lee Ann, my administrative assistant made the bond even closer with Irma. As Father Pete spoke at her funeral service, she defended and was very strong about her Catholic religion, and that was very evident in her love for the Village of Cuyahoga Heights, just ask anyone that ever talked “politics” with her. As I got older, Irma became more than a co-worker, she became a friend. She served as our Village Treasurer from 1980-1989, Councilwoman from 2000-2005, and again in 2008-2009. While on council she served on many committees; however, she was most proud of introducing the tree cutting and life line for seniors programs. She was a trustee and member of the Cuyahoga Heights Senior Citizens Club, as well as a member of our Historical Committee; she truly loved our Village. Irma Schab passed away at her home on May 4, 2016; she was 79 years old. As I have been told by my elders for many years, life and our time here is very short. Irma enjoyed life every chance she had, and I as well as many others, will truly miss enjoying our time with her.

Hopefully, this repair will help serve our little people until a splash park can be facilitated in the future. Projects/Grants

Although sad, the old Village Hall (*Betty's house*) had to come down, there was little or no value historically. We were able to secure a grant with the Cuyahoga County Land Bank for the demolition of this property at no cost to the Village. This is yet another example of our administration and council's continued efforts on the revitalization of the north end of East 71st Street in paving the way for future business development.



In reference to the former Hillside property, Village Engineer Todd Sciano is preparing the plans and specifications to bid for demolition. The demolition is also being done at no cost to the Village through our successful award of the Cuyahoga County Property Demolition Fund Round 3. This will be shovel ready for future development by the end of the year.

From the Clerk:

Our finances are stable and we continue to be vigilant in watching our budgets. The department heads have taken an active role in making sure they stay within their budgets, and use the money we have appropriated for their departments wisely. Years ago, we had so much money we could spend anything we wanted, and still have money left over. Those days are gone.

We started the month of April with 1.56 million dollars in our General Fund, and after paying all of our bills for April, we finished the month with 1.82 million in our General Fund, almost a \$300,000.00 increase. If you look at the RITA chart, our increase in taxes for the first 4 months from last year, is \$323,145.65, and this is how we get the increase in our General Fund. We cannot rely on every month being an increase, so we need to keep a close watch on our RITA revenue.

We still have to transfer 1 million dollars from the General Fund to other funds, which will bring our General Fund down to around 1 million, which is where I projected our General Fund will be at the end of the year.

As you can see, we will be fine financially, but my concern has always been the Capital Projects Fund. Currently we have \$41,800.00 in that fund, and if we are to do any major projects in the future, we need to add revenue. We can sustain our budget for many years if we only pay bills and salaries, which is what we have done, but if we are going to do any major projects, we need to add extra revenue. This can only be done with a tax increase that will be on the ballot in August.

Fire Department:

From all of us, we wish everyone a safe and Happy Memorial Day. It is an important time to remember all those Americans who have fought to keep this country safe and free. It is a day to honor and respect the armed forces, those who have already sacrificed, and those who continue to serve our country still today.

Also, congratulations to all the 2016 Cuyahoga Heights High School graduates. Good luck on your next adventures and we wish you success in everything you do.

Below are some safety tips form the NFPA for this upcoming Holiday weekend and summer.

Propane and charcoal BBQ grills should only be used outdoors.

- * The grill should be placed well away from the home, deck railings and out from under eaves and overhanging branches.
- * Keep children and pets at least three feet away from the grill area.
- * Keep your grill clean by removing grease or fat buildup from the grills and in trays below the grill.
- * Never leave your grill unattended.
- * Always make sure your gas grill lid is open before lighting it.

CHARCOAL GRILLS

- * There are several ways to get the charcoal ready to use. Charcoal chimney starters allow you to start the charcoal using newspaper as a fuel.
- * If you use a starter fluid, use only charcoal starter fluid. Never add charcoal fluid or any other flammable liquids to the fire.
- * Keep charcoal fluid out of the reach of children and away from heat sources.
- * There are also electric charcoal starters, which do not use fire. Be sure to use an extension cord for outdoor use.
- * When you are finished grilling, let the coals completely cool before disposing in a metal container.

PROPANE GRILLS

Before using it for the first time each year, apply a light soap and water solution to the hose. A propane leak will release bubbles. If your grill has a gas leak, by smell or the soapy bubble test, and there is no flame, turn off both the gas tank and the grill. If the leak stops, get the grill serviced by a professional before using it again. If the leak does not stop, call the fire department. **If you smell gas while cooking, immediately get away from the grill and call the fire department.** Do not move the grill. If the flame **goes out**, turn the grill and gas off and wait at least **5 minutes** before re-lighting it.

Dispatch:

We sent out a SwiftReach notification a couple weeks ago. If you did not receive one and would like to be in our system, you can either use the SwiftReach portal on the Cuyahoga Heights Village Website on the Police page or contact the Police Department directly at 216-883-6800. The SwiftReach system is used to notify our residents and businesses, by telephone, of any emergency situations that may occur in Cuyahoga Heights. The telephone numbers you supply the Police Department are kept strictly confidential and are not given out to the public.



Just a reminder to all our residents, if you are going on vacation you can call dispatch at 883-6800 to put a special attention on your home. We are going to ask you when you will be leaving and when you will be coming home, if you have stopped your mail and paper, if you are going to leave any lights on in your home, if anyone will be stopping at your home during your absence and an emergency telephone number in case there is a problem. Dispatch will then forward that information to the police officers so they can check your residence throughout the day and night.

From the Sports Commissioner:

Special Pick Up

If you need a special pick up for trash that is oversized, large amounts, or hazardous waste, don't forget to call the Village Hall to be put on the Special Pick Up list. Special Pick Up day is on Tuesday mornings, unless there is a holiday on Monday, at which time, the Special Pick up will be taken care of on Wednesday. **You must call the Village Hall by 4:00 on Monday to get on the list for Tuesday's pick up.** Your assistance is appreciated.

Pet Waste

Please remember to pick up after your furry friends when walking them in the Village, especially on sidewalks and tree lawns.

Table and Chair Rental

Tables and chairs can be rented from the Service Department (limit of 3 tables and 30 chairs). You must pick them up and bring them back to the garage. You will need to stop in at the Service Department and sign the loan form. Please be advised that tables and chairs are not permitted to leave the Village. If they are taken out of the Village, you will lose this privilege.

Yard Waste

Yard waste (i.e., grass clippings, tree branches, leaves, etc.) must be put in bags or separate trash cans, **not in the 95 gallon Village issued grey trash cans or blue recycling cans.**

Pest and Insect Control

Pest Control services are available by calling Rich or Jeremy Kozlovich at Pest Management, Inc., at (216) 661-3553. Please leave a message with your name, address, and nature of problem. This service is free except for termites, bed bugs, and wildlife. The Village also sprays the outside of your home in the spring to hinder any unwanted pests from entering into your home.

Good Canine Citizens

Pet owners, please remember to pick up dog droppings while enjoying Bacci Park with your pet. There are children that play in the area, and they are not as attentive to minding where they are walking or what they are walking on. In addition, please be sure to walk your pet on a leash for safety reasons. Your cooperation is appreciated.

Service Department *(continued)*:

Grass Cutting Reminder!

660.15 WEEDS AND GRASSES

(a) Every owner, occupant or person in control of any lot or land within the Municipality shall cause to be cut and destroyed all Russian, Canadian or common thistle, wild lettuce, wild mustard, wild parsley, ragweed, ironweed and all other noxious weeds growing or being upon such lot or land and shall cut any other weeds or grasses to a height not to exceed six inches within two days of the receipt of notice as hereinafter provided. The Service Director shall issue notice to the owner, occupant or person in control of any lot or land within the Municipality, upon which any of the aforementioned noxious weeds, or grasses or other weeds in excess of six inches, are growing or standing, to cut and/or destroy the weeds and/or grasses within two days. The notice may be served by delivering it by one or more of the following procedures: personally delivering it to the owner, occupant or person in control of the land; delivering it or mailing it by regular or certified mail at the usual place of business or residence of the owner, occupant or person in control of the land; posting it in a conspicuous place on the land involved. A separate offense shall be deemed to have occurred each day on which such weeds or grasses are allowed to stand longer than two days after the receipt of such notice.

(b) Weeds or grasses which are not removed or cut as required by division (a) hereof are declared to be nuisances. The Service Director shall cause the abatement of the nuisance and shall report the cost thereof to Council which may assess the same on the real estate on which the nuisance existed. Such remedy shall be in addition to the penalty provided in division (c) hereof.

(c) Whoever violates this section is guilty of a misdemeanor of the fourth degree and shall be subject to the penalty provided in Section 698.02.

CUYAHOGA VALLEY CAREER CENTER PROGRAMS:

STEM Summer Camps at Cuyahoga Valley Career Center, 8001 Brecksville Road, Brecksville.

All camps run from 8 a.m. - 3 p.m., Monday through Friday. Camp fees are \$195 per week for in-district students and \$205 per week for students residing outside of CVCC's eight member districts. Engineering Summer Camp (Grades 5-7) June 6-10 and June 13-17

A great opportunity for students to get an introduction to the world of engineering:

- Each will begin introducing an engineering discipline. Students will then design, build and test projects which correlate to that discipline.
- Monday through Thursday will focus on the four main disciplines (Chemical, Civil, Mechanical and Electrical). On Friday, students will learn the ways engineering helps people.
- Projects the students will build include: rockets, catapults, balloon cars, flashlights, laser mazes, emergency shelters and solar ovens (which they'll use to cook hotdogs).

3D Design & Printing (Grades 8-10) June 6-10 & June 13-17
