
From the Mayor (continued):

From the Clerk:

As you can see from the RITA chart, the tax increase we passed last year is starting to kick in for 2017. At the beginning of the year, I explained that it would take a couple months before we would see any monthly increases. Comparing our tax revenue for the month of May to last year, we are showing a \$213,631.75 monthly increase from May 2016.

This increase in revenue will enable us to accomplish many projects, and capital purchases that have been on hold. Due to the financial crises of 2008, it has taken us eight years to stabilize our workforce and our expenses. Over the years, we continued to watch our spending, and adjust our workforce as necessary. It was the hardest years we ever faced, but as you can see from the RITA chart, we are now financially sound, and moving forward with continuing to make our Village a great place to live and raise a family.

This administration has worked very hard to make us financially stable, and I am very proud to have helped in this process. Our finances are solid, and we continue to be vigilant in watching our budgets. This administration will continue to spend wisely, and make good financial decisions that will benefit all residents.

The pool is scheduled to open in June, and many of our resident children will be working there as Lifeguards and Checkers. What a wonderful benefit to our local students. This has been a tradition in Cuyahoga Heights for many years, and we continue to carry the torch in giving our kids these opportunities.

CHPD Honor's Fallen Officers

In 1962, President John F. Kennedy signed a proclamation which designated May 15 as Peace Officers Memorial Day and the week in which that date falls as Police Week. The Greater Cleveland Police Officer Memorial society hosts one of the largest commemoration weeks in the country. There are numerous activities such as a Police Memorial Mass, Grave Decoration Ceremony and Police Memorial Parade. The week ends with the Memorial Ceremony at the Police Officer Memorial where the fallen officers and their survivors are honored.

The mission of the Greater Cleveland Peace Officers Memorial Society is to honor peace officers who have made the supreme sacrifice in the performance of service to their communities and the nation, especially those from the Greater Cleveland area, including Cuyahoga, Geauga, Lake, Lorain, Medina, and northern Summit Counties. Located at the corner of West 3rd St. and Lakeside Ave in downtown Cleveland, the Greater Cleveland Peace Officers Memorial features the names of each officer who has died in the line of duty from our area, surrounded by a beautifully landscaped garden that invites contemplation.

On Friday May 19, 2017 members of the Cuyahoga Heights Police Department were given the honor of standing guard over the Greater Cleveland Peace Officers Memorial. Beginning at sunrise, guards were placed at each pillar of the memorial. A changing of the guard occurs every half-hour until the start of the Memorial Ceremony at noon. During this watch, every officer killed in the line of duty the previous year has their name, rank, department and "End of Watch" date read aloud for all to hear. I was very humbled to have had the opportunity to read a portion of that honored list.





Last year in the United States, 145 law enforcement officers paid the ultimate sacrifice of which five belonged to Ohio. This year two names from our area were added to the Greater Cleveland Memorial, OHSP Trooper Kenneth Velez (EOW 9-15-2017) and Cleveland Police Officer David Fahey (EOW 1-24-2017). Both of these officers tragically lost their lives on I-90 as the result of being struck by motor vehicles.

The telephone numbers you supply the Police Department are kept strictly confidential and are not given out to the public.



We can now enter your cell phones with your phone carrier in the SwiftReach system so that a text message can be sent to you, please use the SwiftReach portal on the Village website or you can call or email me at b.cash@cuyahogaheights.com at the Police Department and I will make the change in the system.

In addition, we will be placing ads in the Neighborhood News and Sun Courier in an effort to promote our Village wide garage sale. The deadline to register is Wednesday, June 7 -- call now to register.

Village Pest Control Program

Pest control services are available to our residents free for the inside and outside of your home. However, this service does not cover termites and bed bugs. If you are having a pest problem, please contact Rich or Jeremy Kozlovich at Pest Management, Inc., at (216) 661-3553, 1-800-794-2035, or Rich's cell phone at (440) 343-1316. If Rich or Jeremy are not available, please leave a message with your name, address, phone number and brief message. All questions will be answered promptly.

Newspaper and Cardboard Recycling

Do your part in helping the environment; recycle cardboard and newspaper! The Village of Cuyahoga Heights has a recycling container at Bacci Park for this specific type of recycling! The container is strictly for cardboard and newspapers. Stop on down, at any time, with your cardboard and newspapers and do your part in recycling.

If you have a large amount of cardboard and/or newspapers and are unable to take it to the container, please call the Village Hall during normal business hours prior to Tuesday mornings; we will put it on our Special Pick Up list. The Service Department will then pick up your large amount of newspaper and/or cardboard with our regular special pick up items. The revenue that we generate from this recycling will go back into our recycling program. Thank you for doing your part and being environmentally friendly . . . GO GREEN!

Village Bus

The Village bus operates on a weekly basis for our senior citizens; a schedule of the monthly bus run is usually inserted in with our Village Newsletter. For your convenience, attached with this newsletter is the current calendar. Reservations are required and obtained by calling the Village Hall at 641-7020 prior to 8:30 a.m. on the morning of the trip. For a Saturday trip, please call the Village Hall before 4:00 p.m. on Friday. All trips leave approximately at 9:00 a.m. unless otherwise noted on the calendar. Pick-ups and drop offs are made at the resident's home.

Please note that all riders of the Village bus must fill out an emergency contact form. This form was established by Council to promote safety for all residents and organizations that use the Village bus. In case of emergencies, it is very important that he Village be able to call those individuals who you designate as emergency contacts. It not only helps our bus driver, but it helps you too! The bus driver will keep this form on the bus. Please inform your contact person of any medications or conditions that would need to be available in case you were taken to the hospital. Please not that all non-residents who ride the Village bus for special bus trips must pay a \$5.00 fee. The fee may be paid at the Village Hall prior to the trip or paid to the bus driver on that day.

Service Department:

Senior Grass Cutting

The Cuyahoga Heights Service Department will be cutting grass free of charge for our Senior Citizens and disabled persons who qualify according to the Ordinance:

- Registrant must be sixty (60) years of age or older and must reside alone or with a spouse of like age or older, or the registrant must be disabled and not have an able-bodied person living with him or her who is under sixty (60) years of age.
 - "Disabled" means physical or mental impairment that substantially limits one or more major life activities, including, but not limited to, the functions of caring for one's self, performing manual tasks, walking, seeing, breathing, learning, and working.
- The property registered must be a single-family dwelling, a two-family dwelling, or a multiple family dwelling <u>and the owner of the property must reside at the registered property</u>.
- Registrant must execute a consent and release, in a form approved by the Solicitor, granting permission to the Village to provide the grass cutting service and releasing the Village, its servants, agents and employees from any liability arising out of the cutting of grass on the registrant's property.

Please note that our Village is not responsible for grass length, the grass cutters are set at a standard height and will not be changed. If you have a dog, please clean the area of dog waste so we can cut the yard properly. If you have already registered in the past, then you need not re-register.

Hazardous Waste Round-Up

This is a year round program – please call the Village Hall if you have hazardous waste that needs to be picked up.

Pet Waste

Please remember to pick up after your furry friends when walking them in the Village, especially on sidewalks and tree lawns.



Special Pick Up:

If you need a special pick up for trash that is oversized, large amounts, or hazardous waste, don't forget to call the Village Hall to be put on the Special Pick Up list. Special Pick Up day is on Tuesday mornings, unless there is a holiday on Monday, at which time, the Special Pick up will be taken care of on Wednesday. You must call the Village Hall by 4:00 on Monday to get on the list for Tuesday's pick up. Your assistance is appreciated.





Dear Parent:

Children aged 14 and under are very vulnerable to head injury while riding their bikes. This remains true regardless of how responsible and careful your children are when riding their bicycles. Helmets have been shown to reduce the risk of a life-long brain or head injury by 85%. Nationally, AAA reports a small percent of all kids wear bike helmets.

Our police department and community are proud to participate in the Helmet Smart campaign. Through this campaign we are encouraging all parents to take an active role in their children's safety by encouraging all children to wear bike helmets when riding. Did you know helmets that meet ASTM shatter-resistant impact standards can be purchased for as little as \$10? A helmet can save your child's life!

This year officers from our department and other area police departments will issue a Safety Citation when they witness a bicyclist wearing a safety helmet. This citation can be redeemed at any participating location. The bearer of the safety citation is also eligible for a drawing for bicycles from AAA.

We also have available for you information on how parents can encourage their children to make it a habit to wear a bicycle helmet every time they ride their bikes. These materials include the "Parent-Child Contract/Tips for Parents" and information on safety helmet use. Should you have any questions on the Helmet Smart campaign, or on bike helmets, please contact our department or AAA at 800-845-0375.

Remember: your child's bicycle is a vehicle, not a toy. Use of helmets can prevent a tragic life-long injury to your children. Only through your active involvement will your children form the helmet habit every time they ride their bicycles. It is also very important that you set an example for your children by always properly wearing a helmet whenever you are riding a bike. What better way to show your love for your children than to protect them from serious injury by always having them wear a helmet every time they ride their bikes?




Tips for Getting Your Kids to Wear Bike Helmets

1. Help your children establish the habit early by getting them helmets when they begin riding.



- 2. Wear one yourself. Provide a role model for your kids.
- 3. Whenever you first get helmets for your kids, talk about why you want them to protect their heads.
 - Let them know bikes are not toys, but vehicles.
- They can hurt their head permanently or even die from a head injury.
 - Most professional athletes use helmets in sports. Football and hockey players, baseball batters, and race car drivers use them. Bicycle racers are required to use them in the U.S. and in the Olympics.
- 4. Reward kids for wearing helmets. Praise them and consider giving them a treat when they wear their helmet without being told.
- 5. Don't let them ride their bikes unless they wear their helmets. Be consistent!



- 7. Encourage their friends to wear helmets. Peer pressure can be used in a positive way.
- 8. Crashes can occur on sidewalks, driveways, bike paths, and parks, as well as streets. You cannot predict when a situation will occur that results in a dangerous fall. Always wear it even for short rides just down the street.



Remember! Under Ohio Law, bikes are vehicles and must obey the rules of the road.



Do You Know The Correct Way To Wear A Helmet?



Wear the helmet flat atop your head





Not tilted back at an angle



Make sure the helmet fits snugly and does not obstruct your field of vision. Make sure the chin strap fits securely and that the buckle stays fastened.



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

The Flag of the United States of America embodies our country's ideals and moral principles and the values we cherish as citizens. As a soldier in the military, the Flag represents the Constitution of the United States that I pledge to defend and support even at the risk of death.

The Flag is part of every ceremony that involves the initial oath of enlistment into the military, the changing of military commanders and military funerals. Old Glory is so revered that it is raised up the flag pole every morning and lowered every evening in a military ceremony 365 days a year on every military post.

The American Flag's significance is so ingrained into the military that even the folding of it has a very special meaning. The symbolism for each fold is given below. (Excerpted from the Winter 1999 newsletter, Enlisted Association of the National Guard of the U.S.)

First Fold: The symbol of life.

Second Fold: Our belief in eternal life.

Third Fold: Honor and remembrance of the veterans departing our ranks...

Fourth Fold: Represents our weaker nature,...it is to (God) we turn in times of peace as well as in times of war for His divine guidance.

Fifth Fold: A tribute to our country,..."still our country, right or wrong."

Sixth Fold: Where our hearts lie. It is with our hearts that we "pledge allegiance to the flag of the Unites States of America, and to the Republic for which it stands, one nation under God, indivisible, with liberty and justice for all."

Seventh Fold: A tribute to our Armed Forces,...(who) protect our country and our flag against all her enemies...

Eighth Fold: A tribute to the ones who entered into the valley of the shadow of death, that we might see the light of day.

Ninth Fold: A tribute to womanhood, and Mothers...(who) mold the men and women who have made this country great...

Tenth Fold: A tribute to the father, for he, too, has given his sons and daughters for the defense of our country...

Eleventh Fold:...Glorifies in the Hebrews' eyes, the God of Abraham, Isaac and Jacob.

Twelfth Fold:...Glorifies God the Father, the Son and the Holy Spirit.

Thirteenth Fold: Flag is completed folded, (with) the stars uppermost, reminding us of our nation's motto, "In God We Trust."

I have served in the military for almost 29 years and visited many foreign countries, including two in the former Soviet Republic. The value of freedom is no more evident than when you see firsthand the suppression of individual creativity and expression. The American flag symbolizes this freedom, and I for one routinely pledge my allegiance to defend the Constitution that I so dearly cherish.
