VOTE ON ELECTION DAY

Poll Hours: The polls are open for voting from 6:30 a.m. until 7:30 p.m.

BRING IDENTIFICATION A current and valid Ohio driver's license or state identification, or a copy of a current utility bill, bank statement, government check, paycheck, or other government document that shows your name and current address. A passport or notice from a board of elections is not a valid ID for voting purposes.

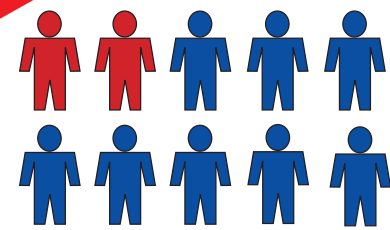


ALL ELECTIONS ARE IMPORTANT: HERE'S WHY

They create policies concerning just about all of the things that touch our lives: roads, bridges, schools, Medicare, Medicaid, parks, public transportation, the military, public assistance and immigration. We also elect judges and prosecutors who control our system of justice.

PRIMARY ELECTION VOTER GUIDE



In primary elections turnout is normally low, about 20%. Think of it like this: if this trend continues, two out of ten people will decide who advances to the 2018 General Election.

Voters will have many important decisions to make from federal offices to state and local issues:

Statewide candidates:

- Governor
- Auditor
- Treasurer
- Secretary of State
- Attorney General
- Supreme Court

Federal candidates:

- US Senate and Congress

State representative:

- Ohio House and Senate

County candidates:

- County Executive and County Council
- County Judges

Party Officers:

- State Central Committee
- Democrat only: County Central Committee

Issues:

- State (Issue One: changes the method of establishing political voting boundaries)
- County
- School
- Municipal
- Libraries

Sample ballots are available on the Board's website to allow people to study the candidates and issues prior to voting.

**YOUR VOTE MATTERS!
STAND UP AND BE COUNTED**

There is no good excuse for skipping the May 8, 2018 Primary Election. Voting by mail, voting early at the Board or on Election Day is easy and convenient.

The May Election determines party affiliation.

Voters establish or change their political party affiliation when they vote in partisan primary elections. They have the option to become a nonpartisan (Independent) voter.

Voters select Democratic, Republican, Green party or "issues only" ballots. The type of ballot they vote will determine their political party. People who request an "issues only" ballot become nonpartisan voters.
