Miscellaneous Home being Moved

Today we see houses and buildings being torn down all over Cleveland and Cuyahoga County. However, back in the day, that wasn't the case in our Village! People MOVED their houses!! And we have quite the lengthy list!

First, we'll start with the homes that were located where the Cemetery, High School, and Elementary Schools are today. As we know today, the first house on the north end of the Cemetery is 4712 E. 71st. The last house on the south end of the Elementary School (Irma Schab's home) is 4912 E. 71st. In between these two homes there were at least 11 addresses/homes that are no longer there! Some were moved, which we'll cover in this newsletter, and some we have no idea what happened to them!

4726 E. 71st was owned by the Hecker family. They appear there in the 1920-1940 census. I do not know what happened to this home.

Houses Moving all over the Village!



4730 E. 71st originally, now at 4704 E. 71st

4730 E. 71st was occupied by the Eichler family in 1930 and the Kruzel family in 1940. It was moved to 4704 E. 71st and then completely renovated by James Henley. Today it looks like the home in the picture above.

4760 E. 71st was occupied by the Galda family in 1920, the Ratajczak family in 1930, and the Czechowski family in 1940. I do not know what happened to this home.

4792 E. 71st was occupied by the Andrew Monsinski family in 1930 and 1940. I do not know what happened to this home.

4794 E. 71st was originally where the School parking lot is today. Ralph Contipelli related to us that this home was at one point in time the Willow Manor Tea Room. It was moved across the street to 4801 E. 71st.

4820 E. 71st sat right where the north end of the high school is today. I don't know what became of the house, but it was in the location of the current high school in 1940.

MORE HOMES ON THE MOVE!!

4834 E. 71st was owned by Robert Kerr in 1930 and 1940. I do not know what became of this home.

4854 E. 71st was the Louis Farrar Dairy from at least 1910-1930. It was moved to 4795 E. 71st, the home most of us know as the Larry Mack Home.





In the images above, you see the house where it originally stood and the new location!

4858 E. 71st was occupied by Isaac Kennedy (one time Mayor of the Village) in 1930, and Fernando Farrar in 1940. It was moved to 4651 E. 71st and currently houses the Historical Committee. The pictures below show the old and new locations:

4860 E. 71st was occupied by Isaac Kennedy in 1940 and was moved to 7130 Bletch Court, the home most of us know as the Wencke home.

4882 E. 71st was occupied by Pharmacist George Vocke in 1910, and by Pharmacist Curtis Phillips in 1920. This was the old Village Drugstore. It was torn down to make way for the school. You can see it in the picture below.



GEORGE W. VOCKE

George W. Vocke, 62, former justice of the peace in Brooklyn Heights, died yesterday after a long illness.

Mr. Vocke was the son of the late Dr. George A. Vocke, a physician here. For many years he operated a drugstore on E. 71st Street in Cuyahoga Heights, where he served as justice of the peace for 21 years. Later he was postmaster of old Willow, O.

He moved to Brooklyn Heights 30 years ago. He was justice of the peace there for several years and later taught citizenship classes under Works Progress Administration. A 32d-degree Mason, he had been a member of Brooklyn Masonic Lodge.

A 32d-degree Mason, he nad oeen a member of Brooklyn Masonic Lodge. Mr. Vocke lived at 1705 Schaaf Road, Brooklyn Heights. Surviving him are his wife, Helen G., and a sister, Mrs. Eda Batt. Services will be at 2 p. m. Tuesday at the Howard A. Edwards funeral home, 13145 Euclid Avenue, East Cleveland.

6-22-1947 Obit for George Vocke

4900 E. 71st - In 1910 and 1920, the Novacki family lived here. In 1930 and 1940 it was the Kalfas Family and the Kalfas Dairy! Mr. Kalfas died in 1943 in this home. The house was moved further back by the current playground and was to be used as a residence for single female teachers. Below are a few images of the backyard of that property.









Lastly, we are back to a house that still stands at the south end - the longtime home of Irma Schab at 4912 E. 71st. It was owned by the Rady family in 1920, and Joseph Evans family in 1930 and 1940.

OTHER HOMES THAT WERE MOVED IN THE VILLAGE!!

4935 E. 71st - The Bletch House Barn - It was moved to 7149 Bletch Court, the current home of Connie Angiocchi and previous home of the Hess Family.

4605 E. 49th is the current location of what we know as the Attewell home. It originally stood at the corner of E. 49th and Grant Avenue. Mr. Attewell bought it from CEI for \$1 and moved it with all the contents in it!

4380 E. 71st was the original location of Patty Smosarski's Home which now stands at 6926 Grant Avenue! From what we can gather, it stood right in the parking lot of the Beaulieu Auto Shop!





7142 Bletch Court - This home was originally a goat barn on E. 71st Street, south of Bletch Court, on the east side of the street, though I don't know exactly where it was located. It was moved to the 7142 Bletch Court location and was originally the home of Casimiro Pallini and Iacopo Angiocchi.



This ends the "moving mayhem!!" How fortunate are we that our ancestors had the "preservation gene!"

DID YOU KNOW?

The cost of moving a house starts at about \$12-\$16 per square foot, but the pricetag goes up steeply if the home is heaver, bigger, has a long distance to go, or there are a lot of obstacles (wires, utility poles, etc.) that must be moved. Moving a large home can cost about \$150,000 - \$200,000 The corner of Warner & Canal Roads was the original location of the Henry home. (Purchased from the City of Cleveland in 1943.)
