From the Chief Fiscal Officer

2018 Year End Finance Update

I am happy to report that the village ended 2018 with 1.4 million dollars in the general fund. We have worked diligently through the year to increase the general funds revenue reserve. It is recommended that municipalities have a reserve that could cover three months of general fund expenses. Income tax revenue in 2018 has increased as shown in the R.I.T.A. chart below. This is due to the passage of the income tax increase from 2% to 2.5% starting tax year 2017. As a reminder, five percent of all net revenues received have been allocated to our capital projects fund, to assist in maintaining our roadways, municipal buildings, slope stabilization, parks and recreational facilities.

From the desk of Chief Sturgill ...

St. Patrick's Day is on the way and green beer will be flowing! If you're planning to partake of the festivities, be sure to plan for the safety of yourself and others first.

Here are some tips to ensure that you're not relying on luck to have a safe, fun St. Patrick's Day whether it's at home or out on the town.

1) Have a designated driver. It goes without saying: Don't ever drink and drive. Plan in advance for someone in your party to abstain from alcohol. Thank them by picking up their (non-alcoholic) tab and reimbursing them for their gas.

2) Have an alternate plan. If no designated driver is available, make other arrangements (before the evening starts, if possible) for a ride home. Options include calling a friend or family member or renting a room at a hotel within walking distance. Many Cleveland areas offer safe driving alternatives, RTA; UBER, LYFT, etc.

3) Drink water and eat food. Don't drink on an empty stomach and keep your belly full.

4) Don't leave your drink unattended. Also, never accept a drink that has been opened for you.

5) Keep an eye on your friends. Make sure your friends stay within their limits, and never let anyone drive drunk. If you have to, take their keys and help them find an alternate way home or to a hotel.

6) If you're the designated driver, drive carefully. Even though you haven't been drinking, others on the road may well have. Drive extra defensively and make sure everyone in your car remains buckled up. Keep a keen eye out for pedestrians, who may not have all their wits about them after a night of partying.

From the Building Department

Contractors performing construction work within our village must be registered per our village code chapter 1448 registration.

Our building department requires contractors and owners contracting work to register by filing a form issued by the building department and providing a certificate of insurance and bond as follows:

- Registration per application form
- Bond of \$20,000
- Certificate of insurance
- Workers compensation insurance
- State licenses and village registration for electrical, HVAC, plumbing, hydronics, refrigeration and fire alarm
- Register with the village tax agency RITA
- Registration fee \$100.00

From the Fire Department

On January 25, we teamed up with the Cuyahoga Heights Elementary School (CHES) to assist with Donuts for Dads. In an occupation that has us working 24 hour shifts, we understand that dads often cannot be at every one of their kids' activities. Therefore, we offered to take part in the CHES Donuts for Dads and escort the students whose dads could not be at the school that day. Our firemen surprised the children at their buses and walked with them to their classrooms--joining them for breakfast. This experience was as much, if not more, fun for our department as it was for the students. Thank you to everyone at CHES for the opportunity and allowing us to be part of this special event.





Doing laundry is most likely part of your every day routine. But did you know how important taking care of your clothes dryer is to the safety of your home? With a few simple safety tips you can help prevent a clothes dryer fire.

- Have your dryer installed and serviced by a professional.
- Do not use the dryer without a lint filter.
- Make sure you clean the lint filter before or after each load of laundry. Remove lint that has collected around the drum.
- Rigid or flexible metal venting material should be used to sustain proper air flow and drying time.
- Make sure the air exhaust vent pipe is not restricted and the outdoor vent flap will open when the dryer is operating. Once a year, or more often if you notice that it is taking longer than normal for your clothes to dry, clean lint out of the vent pipe or have a dryer lint removal service do it for you.
- Keep dryers in good working order. Gas dryers should be inspected by a qualified professional to make sure that the gas line and connection are intact and free of leaks.
- Make sure the right plug and outlet are used and that the machine is connected properly.
- Follow the manufacturer's operating instructions and don't overload your dryer.
- Turn the dryer off if you leave home or when you go to bed.



Dryers should be properly **grounded**.

Check the **outdoor vent** flap to make sure it is not covered by snow.

Keep the area around your dryer **clear** of things that can burn, like boxes, cleaning supplies and clothing, etc.

Clothes that have come in contact with **flammable substances**, like gasoline, paint thinner, or similar solvents should be laid outside to dry, then can be washed and dried as usual.

FACT

(!) The leading cause of home clothes dryer fires is failure to clean them.

From the Dispatch Department

The emergency warning sirens are tested the first Saturday of every month at noon, the siren will run for one minute. Our village has three sirens located throughout the village, one is on the roof of the fire department, one is on Chapek Drive and the other is on one of the buildings at the Northeast Ohio Regional Sewer District. These sirens are used mainly to inform the public of any tornado warning in Cuyahoga County.

Cuyahoga Heights Schools

Pre-Kindergarten Registration/Screening

Registration/Screening for students enrolling in pre-kindergarten during the 2019/20 school year will take place on **Friday**, **March 22**. If you have a child, or know of a child in our school district who is eligible to attend next year, please call the elementary school office at 216-429-5880 to make an appointment for registration. Children who will be **four years old on or before August 1**, **2019** are eligible for the pre-kindergarten program.

The tuition rate for PK students living outside the district for 2019/20 is \$1500.

Garfield Heights Municipal Court Fresh Start Program

The Garfield Heights Municipal Court is helping people clear their outstanding court cases and get their driver's licenses reinstated. The Court is initiating the Fresh Start Program. This is for people who have not paid their fines and court costs. As a result, the Court has suspended their driver's license and issued a warrant for their arrest.

The Court is willing to give them a Fresh Start. It starts with the person paying \$200 to the Clerk of Court. The person will get a release for their driver's license and a date to come back to set up a payment plan for any balance due. "If the offender has multiple cases, the release will be issued on all cases with the payment of \$200 being applied to the oldest case first," Garfield Heights Municipal Court Judge Deborah Nicastro said.

The Fresh Start Program does not apply to offenders who failed to appear for a court date and they were never sentenced. "In these cases, the offender must post bond and get a new court date," Judge Nicastro added.

But, as long as the person sticks to the payment plan, they will be considered in compliance and their driver's license will remain valid. This is all done without any additional court proceedings or having to go before the judge again.

The Fresh Start Program also enables the offender to apply to the Ohio Bureau of Motor Vehicles for its Reinstatement Fee Amnesty Program. More information on that program can be found at www.bmv.ohio.gov/susp-fees-amnesty.aspx.

The Fresh Start Program runs until July 31st. It pertains to both outstanding criminal and traffic cases in the eight communities served by the Garfield Heights Municipal Court: Garfield Heights, Maple Heights, Brecksville, Cuyahoga Heights, Independence, Newburgh Heights, Valley View and Walton Hills.

Pest Control Program

Pest control services are available by calling Rich or Jeremy Kozlovich at Pest Management, Inc., at (216) 661-3553. Please leave a message with your name, address and nature of problem. This service is free except for termites, bed bugs, and wildlife. In addition, they will also spray the outside of your home in the spring to hinder any unwanted pests from entering your home.

Bus Trips

Our Village bus operates one to two times per week for our Village residents, free of charge; schedules are distributed with the Village newsletter. Reservations are required and obtained by call the Village Hall at (216) 641-7020 before 8:30 a.m. on the morning of the trip. For a Saturday, trip, please call the Village Hall before 3:30 p.m. on Friday. All trips leave approximately at 9:00 a.m. unless otherwise noted. In addition, pick-ups and drop offs are made at the resident's home. Please note that there is a \$5.00 non-resident fee.

West Side Market

Seasonal Employment

Concession Stand Cashiers • Park Monitors • Summer Service Dept Laborers • Lifeguards • Pool Attendants • Pool Cashiers • Playground Monitors

Job Requirements for all the above:

- 1. All Cashiers and Park Monitors must be 16 years old by March 1, 2019.
- 2. Lifeguards and Playground Monitors must be 16 years old by June 1, 2019.
- 3. All cashiers must possess proficient math skills, have an outgoing personality, and must be available to work weekends.
- 4. Applications <u>must</u> be turned into the Village Hall by 4:00 p.m. on March 22, 2019 for *Concession Stand and Park Monitors* and by 4:00 p.m. on April 1, 2019 for *Pool*.
- 5. Applications <u>will not</u> be accepted after these dates.
- 6. Lifeguards must be a Certified Lifeguard, CPR Certified and WSI (Water Safety Instructor *if applicable*).

Applications are available online at <u>www.cuyahogaheights.com</u> under "Employment" or at the Village Hall during normal business hours.

Park Monitors and Park Concession Stand Cashiers will start as soon as the weather permits!

The Swimming Pool opens on *Saturday, June 1, 2019* at 1:00 p.m.

Please be advised that submitting an application does not guarantee employment.

From the Service Department

Dumpsters

Residents may rent a Village dumpster for personal use at their home by paying \$30.00 to the village for each dumpster load. Use of the dumpster is for demolition, household goods, or yard waste only. Examples of demolition are: lumber, railroad ties, windows, doors, roofing material, flooring (*not carpeting*), drywall or plaster, stones, rocks, bricks, concrete, cement blocks, etc. Household goods include items typically found in a house clean out. Furniture and appliances should be set aside for special pick up. Yard waste is defined as anything that comes from the ground.

Garbage Pick Up - Recycling - Yard Waste

The Village Service Department collects garbage every Monday morning beginning at 8:00 a.m. at no charge to its residents. Our service department will come into your yard and take your garbage tote and recycling container to the curb; afterwards they will carry it back into your yard. Please not that if a holiday falls on a Monday; the service will commence on Tuesday.

Special Pick Up

If you need a special pick up for trash that is oversized, large amounts, or hazardous waste, don't forget to call the Village Hall to be put on the special pick up list. Special pick up day is on Tuesday mornings, unless there is a holiday on Monday, at which time, the special pick up will be taken care of on Wednesday. You must call the village hall by 4:00 on Monday to get on the list for Tuesday's pick up.

Charity Pick Up

Our service department will pick up any usable item at your residence that you would like to donate to charity on the first Wednesday of each month. Household items, furniture, clothes, etc., are collected and donated to the West Side Catholic Center. No tax receipts are given for this service, and you must call the village hall prior to the first Wednesday of the month for this service.

Newspaper/Cardboard Recycling

Do your part in helping the environment; recycle cardboard and newspaper. Our village has a recycling container which is located in Bacci Park in the rear of the back parking lot. The container is strictly for cardboard and newspaper. Stop on down and do your part in recycling. If you have a large amount and are unable to take it to the container, please call the Village Hall during normal business hours prior to Tuesday mornings; we will put it on our "special pick up" list.

Good Canine Citizen

Pet owners, please remember to pick up dog droppings while enjoying Bacci Park with your pet. There are children that play in the area, and they are not as attentive to minding where they walk or what they are walking on. In addition, <u>please be sure to walk your pet on a leash for safety reasons</u>. Your cooperation is appreciated.
