# From the Mayor's Desk

#### **Around Town**

Mother Nature finally cooperated and it finally stopped raining a few hours before the egg hunt. That didn't damper the children's spirit and it was fun to watch them scurry around for eggs. The Easter bunny was on hand taking pictures with youngsters and seniors alike, and it was nice chatting with residents. I would like to thank everyone who donated a basket or gift to Troop 28's raffle. There were over 45 prizes, and we hope the boys made some extra money for camp this summer. This event was started by our former VFW Post 6566 a very long time ago, and we will continue to make this event a special tradition in our village. We've included an insert with pictures from the event with this newsletter.

Again, we were fortunate, and the rain stopped right before our Arbor Day event. This year, seven memorial trees were planted in and around Bacci Park. The event started with a brief introduction and continued with family members telling stories about their loved ones; it was bittersweet. Arbor Day continues to be a successful event in town and our next scheduled event will be held in April 2021.

Prior to the start of our council meeting earlier this month, Miss Poppy Olivia Grace Bahr from American Legion Post 627 was on hand to collect donations for poppies. For those who may not know, the poppy flower adorned the battlefields of Flanders Field in France during World War I and was looked upon by those serving as a living symbol of their fallen comrades' sacrifices. In 1920 after World War I, the poppy became the official flower of The American Legion Family to memorialize the soldiers who fought and died during the war. Today, the poppy is nationally recognized and worn as a symbol of sacrifice made by the men and women who served and died for their country during a time of war.

Last week, several members of council joined me and our department heads as we attended the annual Cuyahoga Valley Chamber of Commerce's State of the Schools luncheon. Cuyahoga Heights' Superintendent Tom Evans gave an excellent presentation and noted several accolades. This year our school ranked 13<sup>th</sup> in the State of Ohio, Brecksville-Broadview Heights placed 11<sup>th</sup> and Independence 19<sup>th</sup>. The data to achieve this recognition came from 10,728 school districts in the state. Also, for those of you that didn't know, our high school was named a 2013 National Blue Ribbon School. recognized by U.S. News & World Report with a silver medal distinction for being one of the top schools in the nation and the state of Ohio. The district also possesses an award-winning music education program which has received the *Best Communities for Music Education Award* by the National Association of Music Merchants Foundation for ten consecutive years. Congratulations to our school district, we are all very proud of their accomplishments!

I hope I can count on our residents, family and friends to attend our annual Memorial Day service and parade on Monday, May 27. For those that are interested in marching in the parade, step-off time is 10:00 a.m. from Klima Gardens. The procession will end at the war memorial in front of the village hall. We would love to have as many veterans, adults, children and groups as possible to participate in the parade. Set aside a couple of hours, come out and join us as we recognize and honor those Veterans who made the ultimate sacrifice for this great nation. After the service, please join us at Klima Gardens for food and refreshments. "May we never forget, freedom isn't free."

How quickly the months have flown. School will be letting out for the summer and the last day of school is next Friday, May 31. #### Senior citizens

Our transportation program continues to be one of the most utilized services our Village provides. This service is available for our senior citizens (60+) who are otherwise unable to get to their doctor appointments. If any senior citizen has a doctor's visit and are in need of transportation, please contact the Village Hall during normal business hours one week prior to the scheduled doctor's visit.

The Village also operates a well visit clinic with a registered nurse. Residents (60+) are eligible for certain blood work at no charge once a year. # From the Police Department

With the end of the school year quickly approaching the CHS seniors will soon be graduating. This will bring to the community many graduation parties and celebrations. Please keep the following tips in mind in relation to these gatherings.

#### **Student Driving Tips**

- Drive on well-lit roads and be sure to have your charged cell phone with you always.
- Make sure that your date and/or driver does not drink any alcohol.
- Before you leave home, have directions to where you are going.
- Do not take pictures or selfies while driving or as a passenger.
- Keep the radio volume turned low enough so the driver can concentrate.
- Plan ahead make sure you have a safe plan for prom night and keep it!
- Discuss your plans with your friends; remind each other about responsible decisionmaking and confronting peer pressure.
- Know where you are and where your plans will take you next; keep your parents and friends updated.
- Remember to contact your parents if your plans change.
- Do not allow anyone in your car that has alcohol, drugs or weapons. Remember everyone in the car will be held responsible

#### **Parental Guidelines**

- Know who your child is attending the party with and obtain all cell phone numbers.
- Discuss the graduation events and parties with your teen and with other parents.
- Talk with your teen about guidelines and a curfew. Talk about the consequences of violating these rules.
- Talk to your teen about the serious dangers and consequences of underage drinking and driving.
- Remind your child that you are there for them, if they need a ride home. <u>No questions</u> asked!

#### When Your Teen Attends A Party

- Contact the parents/adults to verify the occasion and the time of the party.
- Ensure that an adult will be home and that there will be no alcohol or other drugs permitted.
- Be sure to know the location of the party and the phone number of those hosting the party.
- Arrange transportation beforehand. Assure your teen that you or a specified neighbor or friend can be called if a ride home is needed.
- Agree on curfew times with your teen before the party starts.
- Be awake when your teen gets home. This will give you the opportunity to talk with your teen and to check their arrival time.

#### **Hosting Teenage Parties**

- An adult should be present at home throughout the length of the party.
- When possible, do not have the party in a separate part of the house.
- Parents need to stay visible during the entire party.
- Bring snacks or non-alcoholic beverages to where the teens are congregated and wander through often to say hello.
- Do not allow any teen who leaves the party to return to the gathering.
- Remember, Ohio law prohibits providing alcohol to minors. www.dontserveteens.gov







# From the Police Department (continued)

#### 612.02 SALES TO UNDERAGE PERSONS; PROHIBITIONS AND MISREPRESENTATIONS

- (b) No person who is the owner or occupant of any public or private place shall knowingly allow any underage person to remain in or on the public place while possessing or consuming beer or intoxicating liquor, unless the intoxicating liquor or beer is given to the person possessing or consuming it by that person's parent, spouse who is not an underage person, or legal guardian and the parent, spouse who is not an underage person, or legal guardian is present at the time of the person's possession or consumption of the beer or intoxicating liquor. An owner of a public or private place is not liable for acts or omissions in violation of this division that are committed by a lessee of that place, unless the owner authorizes or acquiesces in the lessee's acts or omissions.
- (c) No person shall engage or use accommodations at a hotel, inn, cabin, campground, or restaurant when the person knows or has reason to know either of the following:
- (1) That beer or intoxicating liquor will be consumed by an underage person on the premises of the accommodations that the person engages or uses, unless the person engaging or using the accommodations is the spouse of the underage person and who is not an underage person, or is the parent or legal guardian of all of the underage persons, who consume beer or intoxicating liquor on the premises and that person is on the premises at all times when beer or intoxicating liquor is being consumed by an underage person.
- (2) That a drug of abuse will be consumed on the premises of the accommodations by any person, except a person who obtained the drug of abuse pursuant to a prescription issued by a licensed health professional authorized to prescribe drugs and has the drug of abuse in the original container in which it was dispensed to the person.
- (d) (1) No person is required to permit the engagement of accommodations at any hotel, inn, cabin, or campground by an underage person or for an underage person, if the person engaging the accommodations knows or has reason to know that the underage person is intoxicated, or that the underage person possesses any beer or intoxicating liquor and is not supervised by a parent, spouse who is not an underage person, or legal guardian who is or will be present at all times when the beer or intoxicating liquor is being consumed by the underage person.

Violation of the above is a misdemeanor of the first degree.



## When you call the police

- Speak calmly and clearly
- Give your full name and phone number so we can call you back if we need more information
- Be patient, the dispatcher may have an emergency on the next line





Just a reminder to all our residents that if you are going on vacation you can call dispatch at 883-6800 to put a special attention on your home. We are going to ask you when you will be leaving and when you will be returning home, if you have stopped your mail and paper, if you are going to leave any lights on in your home, if anyone will be stopping at your home during your absence and an emergency telephone number in case there is a problem. Dispatch will then forward that information to the police officers, so they can check your residence throughout the day and night.

Pest control services are available by calling Rich or Jeremy Kozlovich at Pest Management, Inc., at (216) 661-3553. Please leave a message with your name, address and nature of problem. This service is free except for termites, bed bugs, and wildlife. In addition, they will also spray the outside of your home in the spring to hinder any unwanted pests from entering your home.

## <u>Dumpsters</u>

Residents may rent a Village dumpster for personal use at their home by paying \$30.00 to the Village for each dumpster load. Use of the dumpster is for demolition, household goods, or yard waste only. Examples of demolition are: lumber, railroad ties, windows, doors, roofing material, flooring (not carpeting), drywall or plaster, stones, rocks, bricks, concrete, cement blocks, etc. Household goods include items typically found in a house clean out. Furniture and appliances should be set aside for special pick up. Yard waste is defined as anything that comes from the ground.

## Table & Chair Rental

This service is available to our residents, as long as you are able to pick up and drop off the tables and chairs at the service garage. The maximum number of tables and chairs you can rent are: (3) tables; (30) chairs. In addition, the tables and chairs must be used at the resident's home and are <u>not</u> to be taken out of the Village. Please contact the Service Department at (216) 641-3505 to make arrangements to reserve tables/chairs. Please leave a message on their answering machine if no one is able to take the call.

## Rototilling

The Cuyahoga Heights Service Department will rototill residential gardens once a year, free of charge, upon request. Area to be rototilled must be clearly marked. Please call Village Hall to be put on the list.
