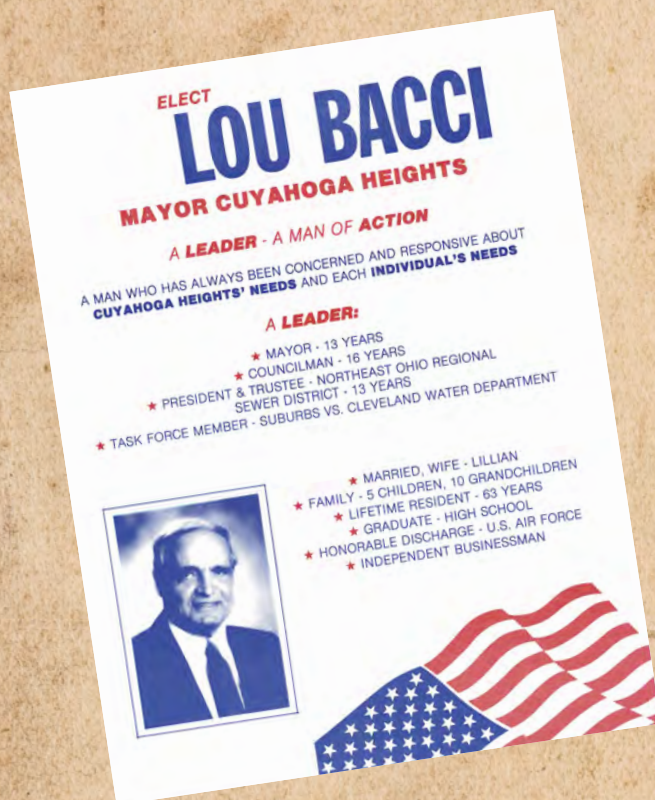

Seeking Public Office

One of our most precious freedoms is the right to vote! Some remark “it was vicious,” but in the end “we were all neighbors.” Others remember it as “hurtful and very personal,” yet many recall the serious effort of putting yourself out there; the campaign and the total disappointment; but tried again.

Here are some examples of campaign literature, buttons and a bit of Cuyahoga Heights political nostalgia. Memories of some residents were of what seemed to be lavish parties of the time held by both slates, yes, *slates*, put forth to woo your vote!

Big Bill Gerdon’s Progressive Party; John Hanousek, Jack Klima and the Citizens Slate; and Lou Bacci’s Civic Party Team were grass roots politics at it’s best. Norbert Chase recalls brainstorming sessions held in their kitchen with everyone crowded around the table, planning a better local government.

Although there are no photos, I remember hand-painted plywood campaign signs being created in the basement of our Bacci home at 4574 East 49th Street. They were probably painted by artist Marco Vaccher. One had a broom on it and called for “a clean sweep” while the other, calling upon the Polish heritage of our community: “Pull up your ‘gacies’ (long underwear) and vote for Bacci!” Another opposition slogan, according to Ralph Contipelli, called for “...ease your burden, vote for Gerdon.”

Election eve, these sparring forces paraded around the village in trucks or cars, or whatever was available, with loud speakers blaring to remind you that their candidates had your best interest at heart. They also waited, hoping to respond to last-minute literature the opposition put out that might affect voters’ choices.

For years there were paper ballots, hand counted, then we graduated to huge voting machines. These machines had levers under each name or issue that the voter would pull down to select his or her choice. When voters finished making selections, a large lever was pushed to the side completing the voting process.

We are now very technologically advanced and vote on ballots that are scanned electronically into the system. Residents of Cuyahoga Heights can also vote at home from the comfort of their own living rooms. Sadly though, there is voter apathy and voting attendance is down, even in small town America, where we have our most direct say in how we are governed.

Local Political Parties Campaign Literature

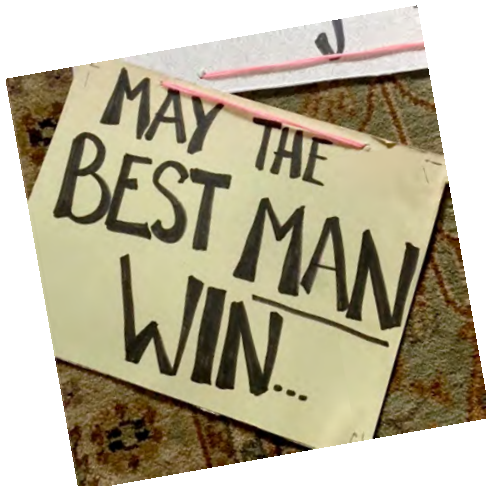
Included in these scrapbook pages are items that demonstrate how cleverly local campaign propaganda was incorporated into something as benign as a Cuyahoga Heights Home Day program in 1949. “Big” Bill Gerdon, touting his Progressive Party candidates wasn’t shy about the size of his picture either—a full page!

The Civic Party Team, later the Citizen’s Party, made sure their literature during campaign season was bold and covered all the bases including a category they titled: “Nuisances.” This team, who put forth not only Louis Bacci, but also John Hanousek and Jack Klima for the mayor’s seat, dreamt big. In 1963, they proposed plans for an awesome year-round recreational facility, including living quarters for its custodian at Chapek’s Grove. Eventually the plan was modified, but the facilities have served residents well over the decades.

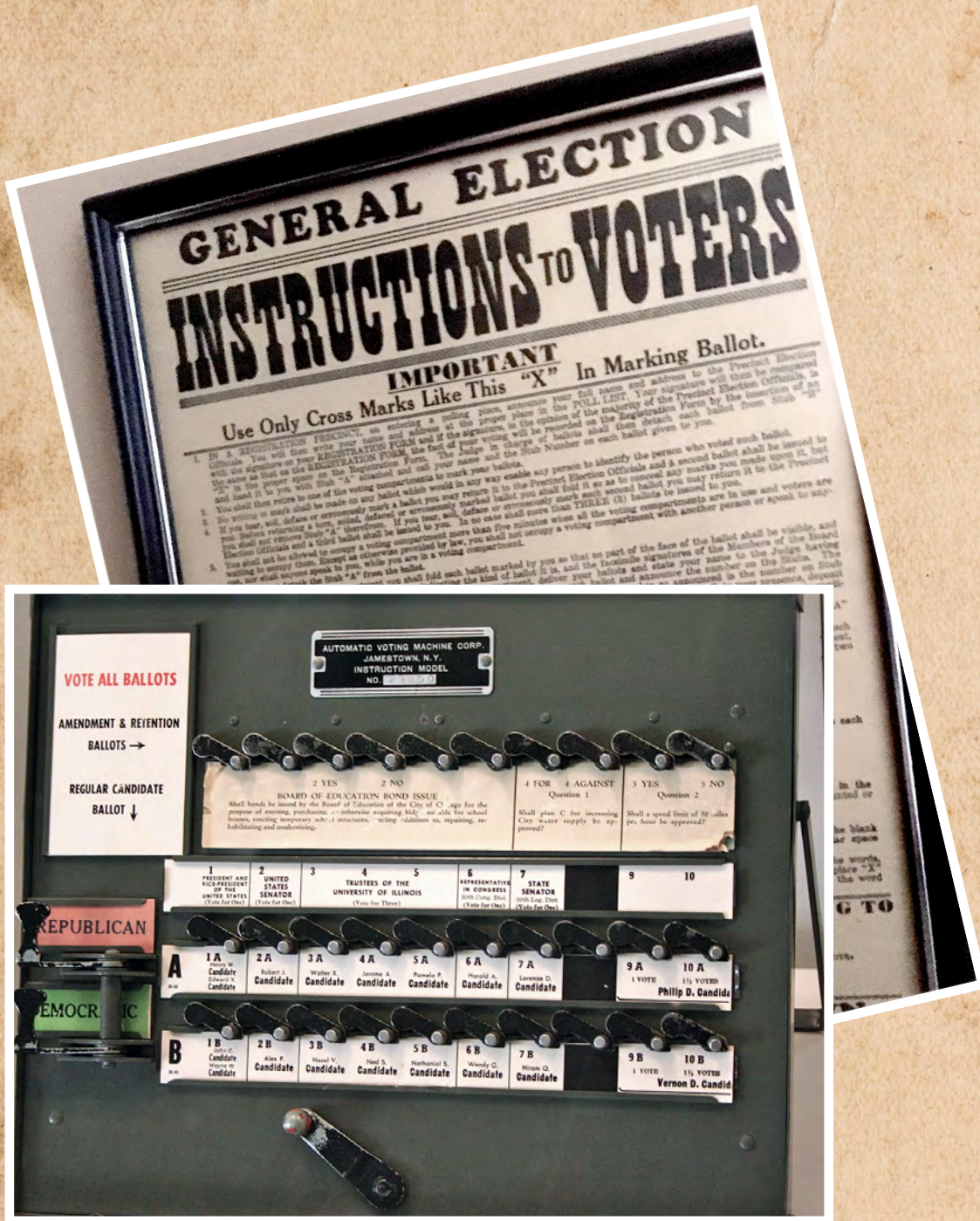
Jack Klima served as mayor as noted earlier and Lou Bacci was finally elected mayor in 1972. In these early years, there weren’t many women visible in our local government. But as time moved along, the ladies of Cuyahoga Heights chose a more active role and ran for elective offices—serving as clerk, treasurer and on village council. In the late 1950s, Helen Dustheimer seemed way ahead of the curve by seeking public office “right alongside the boys.”

I remember the candidates, from both parties/slates standing on the corner of East 71st Street and Dressler Court every election morning—all day long. They stood there in all kinds of weather, with a fire burning in a 55-gallon drum to keep them warm and ugh—smelling of smoke. They stopped voters as they poured in to cast their ballots. Years ago, voting was a top priority to every citizen. They knew their vote mattered and counted. Several elections have been decided by a coin toss. I also remember if someone was ill in the hospital, candidates alerted the Cuyahoga County Board of Elections so they could take a ballot out for that person to vote. You never wanted to miss the opportunity to vote.

Mayor Louis Bacci’s wife, Lillian, used to make pizzas and deliver them to the corner for the hungry candidates. Others delivered coffee. It was a long day, with the polls open 13 hours. And, there was always someone who had a bottle of some “spirits” to warm the cockles of everyone’s hearts.

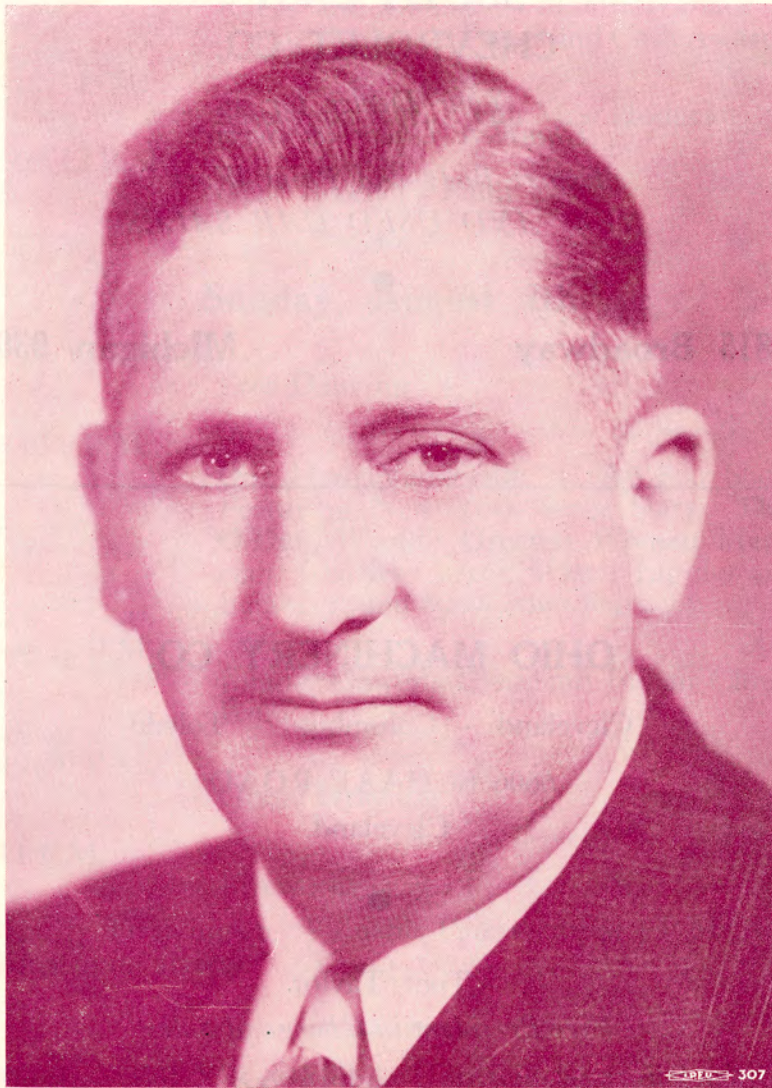

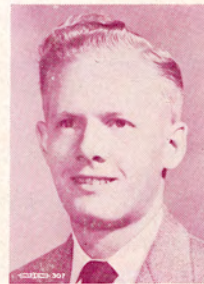

NUISANCES

During the past two years Cuyahoga Heights has become the Number One target of commercial dump operators. JOHN L. HANOUSEK and his CITIZENS PARTY pledge to combat this evil, and, will fight to keep commercial dump operators out of Cuyahoga Heights.

The State of Ohio has definite plans to construct the Outer Belt, south (going east to west) which will eliminate many of our older residents on East 71st Street and Bletch Court. The CITIZENS PARTY is definitely opposed to this route and will recommend that it be moved south of its present proposed location.

At the present time, an organization is striving to change our zoning to permit the building of a motel in our village. The CITIZENS PARTY is definitely opposed to the construction of any motel.

Just because the people of Cuyahoga Heights live near industrial plants does not mean that the many nuisances and health hazards now existing must be permitted to continue. Industries which pollute the air should be stopped or required to install modern means of taking care of obnoxious fumes.

RECREATION

A complete recreation program for the children of the village is necessary. The youngsters should have more recreation equipment and their activities should be supervised — not only for their pleasure, but for their safety.

The gully along the ball field at Chapeks will be filled and a toboggan slide will be constructed.

A dance pavilion at Chapeks will also be constructed.

Ice-skating rinks will be furnished both on East 71st Street and East 49th Street.

The Teen-Age Canteen will be supported whole-heartedly by our Citizens Party.

"HOME DAY" will be re-established with the election of the Citizens Party.

Organization of teams in water sports to compete with other villages will be strongly supported.

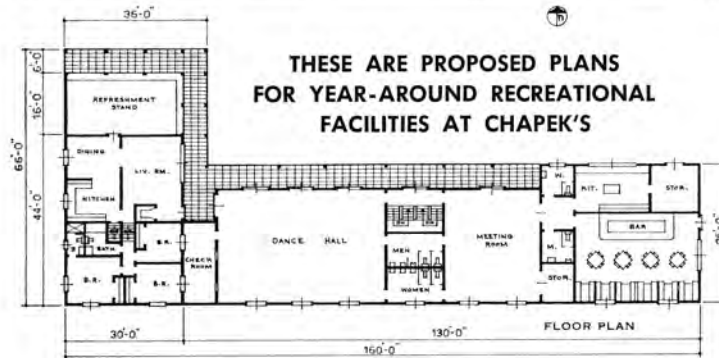
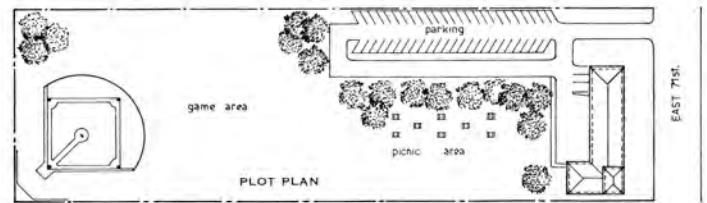

HEALTH CLINIC: Remodeling plans for the basement area of the Town Hall are being studied. The plan includes the establishment of a health clinic for all the residents of the village.

STREET LIGHTING: The Illuminating Co. is currently making a survey of the lighting on all streets. This will include lighting the Freeway as soon as the road is widened.

AIR CONDITION TOWN HALL: The Progressive Slate pledges to Air-condition the Town Hall so as to make it suitable for all-year round social events. Recreation rooms for club, Boy Scouts, Golden Agers etc. are planned in the basement remodeling.

EXPANSION OF RECREATION: We propose plans to expand the recreation facilities at Chapek's since additional space has been made available by the clean fill operation. A suitable shelter and new sanitary facilities are being considered.

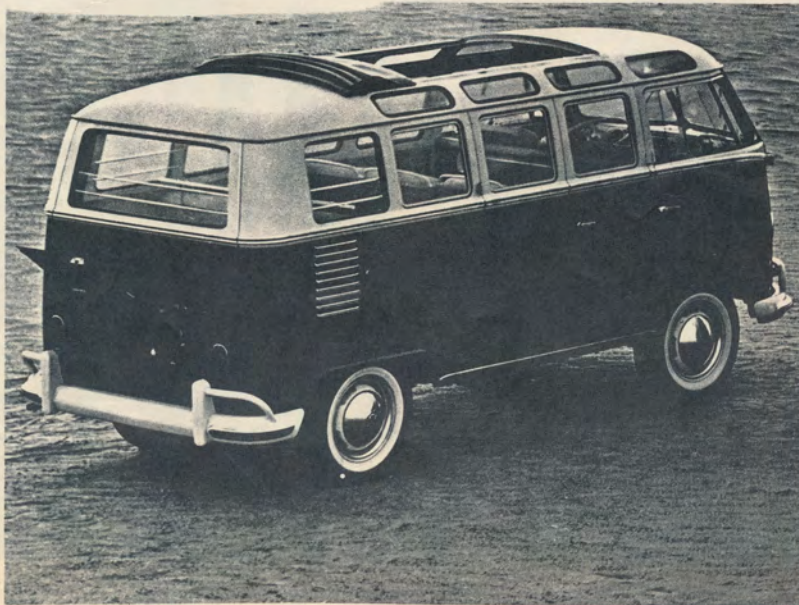

The Citizen's Party looks with pride upon its accomplishments and achievements. Let our past record of service, progress and improvement speak for itself.

WE HAVE . . . built a much needed police station without any increase in taxes.

- . . . purchased a new and modern aerial ladder fire truck to protect our homes and industries in cases of emergency.
- . . . purchased a new ambulance to provide the best possible emergency service for our residents.
- . . . obtained the services of CTS for good public bus transportation at a minimum cost.
- . . . corrected the bad intersection at East 71st Street and Grant Avenue by purchasing property for the widening of Grant Avenue.
- . . . settled the lawsuit involving the East 49th Street hill. The road has been repaired and reopened once again.
- . . . corrected the Willowbrook wall by rebuilding the entire project.
- . . . accomplished getting door-to-door mail delivery on Willowbrook Drive.
- . . . constructed a combined storm and sanitary sewer on East 49th Street to eliminate the flooding of basements in that area.
- . . . extended the storm sewer at the end of Willowbrook Drive and thereby eliminated the extremely hazardous condition that had existed there.
- . . . relocated and improved the East 71st Street playground.
- . . . purchased new equipment for both the East 49th Street and East 71st Street playgrounds.
- . . . obtained an expense-free hospitalization plan for full-time village employees.

OUR 1969 PLATFORM

1. One of the main objectives of the Citizen's Party is to improve the conditions of Chapek's Grove. This area can be renovated into a fine recreational area to be used and enjoyed by all of the village's residents.

(a) We would like to construct a modern pavilion at the picnic grounds. This could be used as a shelter and as a dance floor; it will house kitchen facilities; it will have multi-purpose rooms where classes (such as Arts and crafts) could be conducted for the young and old; there would also be adequate room for summer band concerts here.

(b) The grounds at Chapek's Grove would be prepared to serve two purposes. Part of the acreage would be used for the construction of a long-overdue baseball field for the athletes of our community, including Little Leaguers, Pony Leaguers, and any other interested ballplayers. We advocate the construction of baseball facilities that we can be proud of, including modern lighting, adequate seating, well-landscaped and well-maintained grounds, etc.

(c) The remaining part of the grounds would be used for varied recreational purposes. We would like to install tennis courts and volleyball courts, and build barbeque pits with adjacent tables and facilities to accommodate family picnics for residents of the village.

2. The Citizen's Party feels that our Service Department can be improved by the following two proposals:

(a) We would like to construct a new Service Department garage to house and safeguard our expensive equipment.

(b) We feel that it would be advantageous to hire a full-time mechanic to maintain and keep our equipment in good working condition at all times.

3. To continue the plan to keep our public buildings modern and more comfortable, we advocate the installation of air-conditioning units in the Fire Department building and the village hall. This would make the hall available for all-year use for village residents.

4. We will finish resurfacing East 49th Street and install curbs and gutters south of the Penn-Central bridge. We will also resurface Grant Avenue and East 71st Street.

5. We would construct a firing range and provide necessary training facilities for the Police Department.

6. We consider it important that the Village negotiate with the City of Cleveland for the purchase of land on Canal Road which is now being used for a baseball field.

7. We would like to provide better ice skating facilities by resurfacing the present rinks and improving the lighting.

8. We would adopt a program to clean and maintain the village catch basins and sewers on a regular basis not less than yearly.

9. We think it is important to provide Saturday public transportation for shoppers during the holiday season.

10. The Citizen's Party is concerned, as is every interested citizen, in battling the mounting problem of air and water pollution. We will continue to combat these in every way possible. We will seek outside assistance to better determine solutions. We will discourage the expansion of present landfills and any new landfills within the borders of the village.

We, the members of the CUYAHOGA HEIGHTS CITIZEN'S PARTY, pledge to you, the residents of our village, that, if elected, we will strive to see that the above platform is undertaken without fail, and each PROJECT is completed during the next term of office.
