January Finance Update

R.I.T.A. Revenue

(Regional Income Tax Agency, Local Income and Net Profit Tax)

Total 2019: \$ 12,020,418

Total 2020: \$ 10,284,325

Total 2021: \$ 11,625,531

As you can see the R.I.T.A. revenue in 2021 increased from 2020; however, we still have not seen a full recovery of our pre-pandemic revenues as shown above in our 2019 amount. We are working with R.I.T.A. and reaching out to our major employers in town to get a good feel for those working from home and how that will impact the income tax revenue in 2022. Looks for more updates in the future.

From the Police Department

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From the desk of Chief Sturgill

Dear Residents and Valued Business Partners:

It has been some time since this office has contacted you. I believe the last correspondence sent was June 2020. It seems like 2020 and 2021 were eons ago and somewhat of a blur. These were years like no other.

Just a few of these events (and results) that stand out to me personally are:

- COVID-19 Pandemic: (1.6 million deaths, lock downs, product shortages, mask mandates, closed schools & workplaces, public & private gatherings canceled, largest ever stock market crash -March 9, 2020, highest unemployment rate since the Great Depression, etc.)
- Racial/Social Justice Movements: (the death of George Floyd, mass protests and BLM/Antifa destructive riots, anti-law enforcement sentiment, calls to defund police departments, etc.)
- Presidential Impeachment Hearings: impeachment, acquittal and "quid pro quo."
- **Death of SCOTUS Justice Ginsberg:** which resulted in the appointment of Justice Amy C. Barrett as her replacement.
- 2020 Presidential Election: (most divisive & contested election in American history, protests, riots and confrontations and protests between right-wing and left-wing political groups.)
- The Capitol Hill Protests: by right-wing activists who protested and called for the reversal of the 2020 Presidential election results.

Amid the massive losses inflicted by the global pandemic, the bitter political divisions and racial unrest that exploded into violence, all of the Village of Cuyahoga Heights departments remained on task and continued to provide the service and safety that the residents and businesses deserve.

It is my hope that this country and citizens will eventually find that middle ground, heal wounds and become stronger than ever.

Please know that until then, the Cuyahoga Heights Police Department will always be at the ready to provide a safe place to visit, learn, work and live.

Winter Travel Suggestions

- Check the weather, road and traffic conditions. Leave early if necessary. Familiarize yourself with directions and maps before you go (even if you use a GPS system). Let others know your route and expected arrival time.
- Keep gas tank close to full. If you get stuck in traffic or snow, you might need more fuel to get home or keep warm.
- Cell phone with charger, jumper cables, flashlight and warning devices such as flares/markers.
- Stock, blankets, water, food and any necessary medications (for longer trips).
- Drive slowly. Everything takes longer on snow-covered roads. Accelerating, stopping, turning - nothing happens as quickly as on dry pavement. Give yourself time to maneuver by driving slowly.



- The normal dry pavement following distance of three to four seconds should be increased to eight (8) to ten (10) seconds. This increased margin of safety will provide the longer distance needed to stop.
- Don't stop if you can avoid it. It is more difficult to start from a dead stop than while rolling slowly.
- Don't power up hills. Accelerating on snow-covered roads makes your wheels spin. If possible, safely get a "running-go" before you reach the bottom of a hill and inertia will help get you to the top.
- Avoid stopping while going up a hill. There's nothing more difficult than trying to get moving up a hill on a slick road and you may become stuck. If safe, keep moving up.

Stay home. If you don't have somewhere you have to be, enjoy the snow from home.

From the Police Department (continued)

Snow Emergency Parking Ban -Codified Ordinance #452.13

Please remember that whenever the snow exceeds two (2) inches, the snow emergency & parking ban will be placed into effect. Village Codified Ordinance #452.13 states, "During the period of the emergency, the parking of all vehicles upon any or all of the streets of the village shall be prohibited."



To assist us, we ask that you refrain from parking on the streets if the weather forecast predicts snow that will accumulate two (2) inches or more. We also ask that residents advise guests and visitors that may arrive or be present during any active ban.

The CHPD will attempt to notify all residents when a snow emergency parking ban has been placed in effect. Once the snow ban is in effect, CHPD officers will also attempt to notify the owners of any vehicles found still on the streets. Please note that as a last resort, vehicles may be cited and/or towed.



From the Building Department

Happy New year to all—hope everyone had a great holiday season!

Just a couple of notes from the Building Department. We have one year remaining on the George M. Suhy Grant Program, the five-year program started in 2018 and expires December 31, 2022, so if you have a home improvement project, be sure to take advantage of this great program. Property owners did a great job utilizing the grant program in 2021.

Also, the Building Department will be performing property exterior inspections this spring. All inspections will be done from the right of way. Every homeowner will get an inspection report mailed out to them.

Guidelines for using the George M. Suhy grant program:

- 1. Submit a building permit application to the Building Department.
- 2. Schedule an appointment with the Building Department for a pre-inspection and to receive *Part One* of the grant program application, return permit application and *Part One* of the grant application with proof of ownership of property (tax bill, mortgage receipt or copy of deed) to the Building Department.
- 3. The Building Department will determine the permit fee and notify you.
- 4. When using a contractor, the contractor must be registered with the Village of Cuyahoga Heights.
- 5. Once project has started, make sure all inspections are met.
- 6. When project is complete, notify the Building Department for a final inspection, at that time we will give you *Part Two* of the grant program application.
- 7. Return *Part Two* of the grant application to the Building Department with a final invoice and proof of payment.
- 8. The completed grant application will be submitted to the Finance Department for approval and final payment.

*If guidelines for the grant program are not followed, your grant may be declined.

Health Watch Program

Cuyahoga Heights sponsors a Health Watch Program through the Fire Department for senior citizens who are 60 years of age or older. The program co-pays for an alarm that is worn around the neck of the resident to activate in case of an emergency.

Parks and Playgrounds


The village owns, operates, and maintains Bacci Park with a pond for fishing in the summer and ice-skating in the winter. Bacci Park also has its own playground, two ball fields, three pavilions, and a soccer field. *Please note that fishing in the pond at Bacci Park is for residents only, and by permit which can be obtained from the Cuyahoga Heights Police Department.

2022 Village Scholarship Program

The scholarship program assists village resident graduates. Recipients will be awarded a \$1,000 scholarship in the form of a tuition reimbursement. In order to be eligible for the award the recipients must meet several requirements: (1) be a resident of the Village of Cuyahoga Heights, (2) be a graduating high school senior in the spring or summer of 2022, (3) be enrolled either full-time or part-time at an accredited college, university, community college, vocational or technical school for the fall of 2022, (4) complete the fall 2022 school term with a grade point average sufficient to be in good standing with the academic institution, (5) must submit proof of grades to the CFO's office by March 1, 2023. Applications are available at the High School Guidance Office or at the village hall and must be submitted to the CFO at the village Any questions please email hall by May 1, 2022. cfo@cuyahogaheights.com.

Pest and Insect Control

Pest Control services are available by calling Jeremy Kozlovich at Pest Management, Inc., at (216) 661-3553. Please leave a message with your name, address, and nature of problem. This service is free except for termites, bed bugs, and wildlife. The village also sprays the outside of your home in the spring to hinder any unwanted pests from entering into your home.

Notary Service


Several of our employees at the village hall are Notaries for the State of Ohio, Cuyahoga County and would be happy to notarize items for village residents, free of charge during regular business hours.

Seven Hills Recreation Center

Trying to get healthy for the New Year...join the Seven Hills Recreation Center. The village has continued their agreement with Seven Hills for our village residents to use their facility. Our village will pay 100% of the rate for bona-fide village residents that are 62-years of age and older, U.S. Veterans, and disabled residents. We will also pay 50% of the rate for all other bona-fide village residents desiring to secure a membership as outlined in our price sheet. In order to purchase a membership, please contact the village hall during normal business hours. Each resident/family must show proof that he/she is a bona-fide resident of the Village of Cuyahoga Heights. At that time, you will also need to pay your 50% of the membership (cash or check only) for those not covered under the 100% rate. A copy of the approved application, along with rules and regulations will then be given to the resident. It is then up to the resident to take the approved application to the Seven Hills Recreation Center so that you can receive your official pass. We hope our residents will take advantage of this special offer, as well as keeping fit.

Transports

Just a friendly reminder that our transportation program continues to be one of the most utilized services our village provides. This service is available for our senior citizens (60+) who are otherwise unable to get to their doctor appointments. If any senior citizen has a doctor's visit and are in need of transportation, please contact the village hall during normal business hours one week prior to the scheduled doctor's visit







From the Service Department

Garbage Pick Up—Recycling—Yard Waste

The village Service Department collects garbage every Monday morning beginning at 8:00 a.m. at no charge to its residents. Our Service Department will come into your yard and take your garbage tote and recycling container to the curb; afterwards they will carry it back into your yard. Please note that if a holiday falls on a Monday; the service will commence on Tuesday.

Special Pick Up

If you need a special pick up for trash that is oversized, large amounts, or hazardous waste, don't forget to call the village hall to be put on the special pick up list. Special pick up day is on Tuesday mornings, unless there is a holiday on Monday, at which time the special pick up will be taken care of on Wednesday. You must call the village hall by 4:00 p.m. on Monday to get on the list for Tuesday's pick up.

Charity Pick Up

Our Service Department will pick up any small usable item at your residence that you would like to donate to charity on the first Wednesday of each month. Small household items, clothes, etc., are collected and donated. No tax receipts are given for this service, and you must call the village hall prior to the first Wednesday of the month for this service.

Newspaper/Cardboard Recycling

Do your part in helping the environment; recycle cardboard and newspaper. Our village has a recycling container which is located in Bacci Park in the rear of the back parking lot. The container is strictly for cardboard and newspaper. Stop on down and do your part in recycling. If you have a large amount and are unable to take it to the container, please call the village hall during normal business hours prior to Tuesday mornings; we will put it on our "special pick up" list.

Dumpsters

Residents may rent a village dumpster for personal use at their home by paying \$30.00 to the village for each dumpster load. Use of the dumpster is for demolition only. Examples of demolition are lumber, railroad ties, windows, doors, roofing material, flooring (not carpeting), drywall or plaster, stones, rocks, bricks, concrete, cement blocks, etc.





From the Service Department (continued)

Meals on Wheels

Prepared by Lori's Custom Catering

This service is available to any village resident that is 60 years of age or older. A lunch time meal will be delivered to your home daily, Monday through Friday, by our Service Department. This is an affordable option, the cost is \$25.00 per week, which is only \$5.00 per day (must sign-up up for a full week). To receive meals for a given week payment must be made by the Thursday prior.

- All village roadways will be plowed first and maintained prior to any driveways being plowed.
- Once the Service Director feels that the roadways and municipal buildings have been maintained, the driveways of our senior citizens will be plowed (using the same criteria that applies to our grass cutting service).
- Afterwards, taking into consideration manpower, time and safety issues, the village will help residents with their driveways in the event of a storm that produces more than 2-4 inches of snow at the resident's request.
- All residents must have driveway markers in place in order to allow the Service Department to plow their driveway. The village will provide markers and place them for all seniors who qualify for the "grass cutting program." Residents with shorter driveways need 4 markers in place, and long driveways must have 6 markers. They need to be placed at the beginning, middle (if long drive), and at the end of your drive. If you wish to purchase markers from the village for \$1 each, please stop at the Service Department. Should you have any questions please contact Service Director Dave Sammons at 216-641-3505.
- Please note that residents are responsible for cleaning their driveway aprons, as it is difficult to plow them over again after the streets are plowed. Each homeowner and/or resident must have a waiver of liability on file at our Service Department. If you already have filled out a waiver of liability and there have been no changes to it, there will be no need to fill out a new one.





Sports and Recreation Department

Sports Registrations

With the new year upon us, please note the registration deadlines for the first two youth recreational sports in 2022, starting with the Spring Soccer. Registration forms for these activities (as well as all youth and adult sports and activities) can be found on the village website by clicking the Recreation tab in the ribbon at the top of the home page. You will then find the registration forms in the drop-down menu under Sports tab. In addition to the registration form, a Recreation Public Health Waiver must be completed for all participants. Forms received after the noted deadlines will incur a late registration fee of \$25.00, and while we do our best to place all children on teams, rosters do fill up quickly and late registrations can impact placement on a team.
