After ten years of admirable sunshine-filled service to our village, Wendy closed the door on this chapter of her story—retiring February 22, 2022.


Yes, we will miss "Miss" Wendy because she became an integral part of our village family—but we thank her for brightening our days—being there to rely on for one wonderful decade.



# From the desk of Chief Sturgill

Dear Residents and Valued Business Partners:



Chances are someone you know has received an ominous call or message from someone pretending to be from the government, alleging that your information has been compromised or demanding immediate payment. IGNORE IT!!! This is just one of the tips that the Social Security Administration Office of the Inspector General (SSA OIG) is sharing to warn consumers about these scams.

Criminals are now expanding their efforts to include other government imposter scams. In a government imposter scam, someone claims to be a Social Security Administration (SSA), or another government employee, and may ask for personal information, demand payment, or make threats.

These scams primarily use the telephone, but scammers may also use email, text messages, social media, or U.S. mail. SSA Inspector General urges everyone to be cautious of any contact supposedly from a government agency telling you about a problem you don't recognize and provides the following suggestions.

Real government officials will NEVER:

- threaten arrest or legal action against you unless you immediately send money
- promise to increase your benefits or resolve a problem if you pay a fee or move your money into a protected account
- require payment with gift cards, prepaid debit cards, wire transfer, Internet currency, or by mailing cash
- try to gain your trust by providing "fake documentation," "false evidence," or the name of a real government official

The public is encouraged to report Social Security-related scams and fraud online @ https://oig.ssa.gov.

For other scams related to government agencies (non-Social Security) should be reported to the Federal Trade Commission @ https://www.ftc.gov/scams.

If you have any further concerns, please contact CHPD Detective Lukas by calling (216) 640-2045 during business hours (M-F 8a-4p). If Detective Lukas is not available, you may leave a message or if immediate assistance is needed, please call (216) 883-6800 and an officer will return your call or be dispatched to your location.

The building department will be performing exterior maintenance inspections on all properties throughout the village starting April 1. All inspections will be done from the curb only. Keep in mind that the George M. Suhy grant program will expire this year—December 31, so if you are looking to improve your property, you may have grant money available. On another note, all garbage cans should be kept either on the side of your home or inside of your garage, the building department will be sending a letter out to all residents on this matter.



#### DID YOU KNOW?

Habitable space, hallways and portions of basements containing these spaces shall have a ceiling height of not less than 7 feet. Bathrooms, toilet rooms and laundry rooms shall have a ceiling height of not less than 6 feet 8 inches.

The Village will be participating in a statewide tornado drill on **March 23 at 9:50 am**. We will be sounding our warning sirens throughout the Village. Below are some safety tips to follow shall we ever have a tornado in our area.

## **Tornado Safety Tips**

Whether practicing in a tornado drill or sheltering during a warning, the Ohio Committee for Severe Weather Awareness encourages Ohioans to DUCK!

- D Go DOWN to the lowest level
- U Get UNDER something
- C COVER your head
- K KEEP in shelter until the storm has passed

# From the Fire Department (continued)





#### **Safety Basics**

A tornado's path of destruction can be more than one mile wide and 50 miles long and can devastate a neighborhood in seconds. You may have little warning, so preparation and planning are key to reducing injuries. It's important to know what to do before, during, and after a tornado:

#### **Before**

Know a safe place: Know the safe places at home, work and at school. Locate local shelters and be aware of the tornado risk in your county or parish.

- Practice tornado drills at home and school.
- Have a plan for how family members will contact one another during an emergency. Establish an
  out-of-area contact (such as a relative or family friend) who can coordinate family members'
  locations and information should you become separated. Make sure children learn the phone
  numbers and addresses and know the emergency plans.
- Prepare a family disaster supplies kit. Families with children should have each child create their own personal pack.

#### **During**

During a tornado watch:

- Remain inside, away from windows and doors.
- Listen to the radio or TV. Keep a battery-operated radio or a NOAA Weather Radio.
- Make sure your family disaster supplies kit is complete.
- Be alert during a thunderstorm watch. Severe thunderstorms can produce tornadoes. Being prepared will give you more time should the weather turn severe.

During a tornado warning - Listen to the radio or TV for weather updates and instructions from local officials. Quick action and planning ahead can save your life! If you get caught in a tornado, know what to do: take shelter immediately; stay away from windows, corners, doors and outside walls; be aware of flying debris. Crouch on the floor near an interior wall or under a heavy object, such as a table. Bend over and place your arms on the back of your head and neck (which are injured more easily than other parts of your body).

#### **After**

Continue to listen to the news and weather updates. Stay away from power lines and broken glass. Be aware of the possibility of broken gas lines and chemical spills. If you smell gas or chemical fumes, immediately evacuate the area and contact authorities. Stay out of damaged buildings and return home only after authorities have issued an all-clear signal.

# From the Village Hall

#### Village Wide Garage Sales

Our annual village wide garage sales will be held on Saturday, June 25 from 8:00 a.m. until 3:00 p.m. Village residents that are interested in participating must register by calling the village hall at 216-641-7020 during normal business hours. By registering your residence for the garage sale, you will receive one table which will be dropped off at your home earlier that week by our service department. Please be advised that there are <u>not</u> enough tables for more than one table per residence. We will be placing ads in the Neighborhood News and on-line to promote this event. **The deadline to register is Thursday, June 9.** 

#### Parks and Playgrounds

The village owns, operates, and maintains Bacci Park with a pond for fishing in the summer and ice-skating in the winter. Bacci Park also has its own playground, two ball fields, three pavilions, and a soccer field. \*Please note that fishing in the pond at Bacci Park is for residents only, and by permit which can be obtained from the Cuyahoga Heights Police Department.



#### 2022 Village Scholarship Program

The scholarship program assists village resident graduates. Recipients will be awarded a \$1,000 scholarship in the form of a tuition reimbursement. In order to be eligible for the award the recipients must meet several requirements: (1) be a resident of the Village of Cuyahoga Heights, (2) be a graduating high school senior in the spring or summer of 2022, (3) be enrolled either full-time or part-time at an accredited college, university, community college, vocational or technical school for the fall of 2022, (4) complete the fall 2022 school term with a grade point average sufficient to be in good standing with the academic institution, (5) must submit proof of grades to the CFO's office by March 1, 2023. Applications are available at the High School Guidance Office or at the village hall and must be submitted to the CFO at the village hall by May 1, 2022. #### **Notary Service**

Several of our employees at the village hall are Notaries for the State of Ohio, Cuyahoga County and would be happy to notarize items for village residents, free of charge during regular business hours.



#### Seven Hills Recreation Center

The village has continued their agreement with the Seven Hills Recreation Center for our residents to use their facility. Our village will pay 100% of the rate for bona-fide village residents that are 62-years of age and older, U.S. Veterans, and disabled residents. We will also pay 50% of the rate for all other bonavillage residents desiring to secure membership as outlined in our price sheet. In order to purchase a membership, please contact the village normal business during hours. Fach resident/family must show proof that he/she is a bona-fide resident of the Village of Cuyahoga Heights. At that time, you will also need to pay your 50% of the membership (cash or check only) for those not covered under the 100% rate. A copy of the approved application, along with rules and regulations will then be given to the resident. It is then up to the resident to take the approved application to the Seven Hills Recreation Center so that you can receive your official pass. We hope our residents will take advantage of this special offer, as well as keeping fit.



#### **Medical Transports**

Our transportation program continues to be one of the most utilized services our village provides. This service is available for our senior citizens (60+) who are otherwise unable to get to their doctor appointments. If any senior citizen has a doctor's visit and in need of transportation, please contact Mindy Armbrust at 216-641-2702 during normal business hours—one week prior to the scheduled doctor's visit.

#### Garbage Pick Up - Recycling - Yard Waste

Our service department collects garbage every Monday morning beginning at 8:00 a.m. at no charge to its residents. They will come into your yard and take your garbage tote and recycling container to the curb; afterwards they will carry it back into your yard. Please note that if a holiday falls on a Monday; the service will commence on Tuesday.



#### Special Pick Up

If you need a special pick up for trash that is oversized, large amounts, or hazardous waste, don't forget to contact the service department to be put on the special pick up list. Special pick up day is on Tuesday mornings, unless there is a holiday on Monday, at which time the special pick up will be taken care on Wednesday. You must call the service department at **216-641-3505** by 4:00 on Monday to get on the list for Tuesday's pick up.

#### Charity Pick Up

Our service department will pick up any small usable item at your residence that you would like to donate to charity on the first Wednesday of each month. Small household items, clothes, etc., are collected and donated. No tax receipts are given for this service, and you must call the service department at **216-641-3505** prior to the first Wednesday of the month for this service.

# From the Service Department (continued)

#### Newspaper/Cardboard Recycling

Do your part in helping the environment; recycle cardboard and newspaper. Our village has a recycling container which is located in Bacci Park in the rear of the back parking lot. The container is strictly for cardboard and newspaper. Stop on down and do your part in recycling. If you have a large amount and are unable to take it to the container, please call the service department during normal business hours prior to Tuesday mornings; we will put it on our "special pick up" list.



#### **Dumpsters**

Residents may rent a village dumpster for personal use at their home by paying \$30.00 to the village for each dumpster load. Dumpsters can be used for yard waste, construction debris or miscellaneous household items NOT including carpet, tires, or hazardous waste. Please do not mix materials. Contact the Service Director at 216-641-3505 for this service. Use of the dumpster is for a maximum of two (2) weeks. After two (2) weeks, the dumpster will be picked up from the resident's home. If the resident needs to use it again, he/she will go back on the waiting list. Please note that the disposal of debris created from outside the village is prohibited.

#### **Pest and Insect Control**

Pest control services are available by contacting our service department at 216-641-3505 with your name, address, phone number, and the nature of your problem. We will then reach out to our pest control vendor. This service is free except for termites, bed bugs, and wildlife. The village also sprays the outside of your home in the spring to hinder any unwanted pests from entering your home.

#### Meals on Wheels by Lori's Custom Catering

This service is available to any village resident that is 60 years of age or older. A lunch time meal will be delivered to your home daily, Monday through Friday, by our service department. This is an affordable option, the cost is \$25.00 per week, which is only \$5.00 per day (must sign-up up for a full week.) To receive meals for a given week, payment must be made by the Thursday prior. #### **Sports**

If you registered your child(ren) for spring soccer you should be contacted by their coach soon. We hope they enjoy their soccer season!

Registration just ended for the 2022 youth baseball and softball seasons. We will be working with the other teams in the league for team placements and you will be hearing from a coach once this is complete. If you would still like to register, forms can be found on the village website by clicking the Recreation tab in the ribbon at the top of the home page. You will then find the registration forms in the drop-down menu under Sports tab. In addition to the registration form, a Recreation Public Health Waiver must be completed for all participants. Forms can be dropped off at the village hall or emailed to chvrec@cuyahogaheights.com. Forms received at this point will incur a late registration fee of \$25.00, and while we do our best to place all children on teams, rosters do fill up quickly and late registrations can impact placement on a team.

# Seasonal Employment

Concession Stand Cashiers • Park Monitors • Lifeguards • Pool Attendants • Playground Monitors

Job Requirements for all the above:

- 1. All Park Monitors must be 16 years old by March 1, 2022.
- 2. Concession Stand Cashiers, Pool Attendant, Lifeguards and Playground Monitors must be 15 years old by June 1, 2022.
- 3. All Concession Stand Cashiers must possess proficient math skills, have an outgoing personality, and must be available to work weekends.
- 4. Applications <u>must</u> be turned in by 4:00 p.m. on <u>March 21, 2022</u> for *Concession Stand and Park Monitors* and by 4:00 p.m. on <u>April 4, 2022</u> for *the Pool*.
- 5. Applications will not be accepted after these dates.
- 6. Lifeguards must be a Certified Lifeguard, CPR Certified and WSI (Water Safety Instructor *if applicable*).

Park Monitors and Park Concession Stand Cashiers will start as soon as the weather permits!

The Swimming Pool tentatively opens on Saturday, June 4, 2022 at 1:00 p.m.
