



Door-to-Door Energy Solicitors Impersonating NOPEC Employees

There have been several reports of door-to-door solicitors posing as Northeast Ohio Public Energy Council (NOPEC) employees in several Northeast Ohio communities this Spring.

As a reminder, NOPEC never goes door-to-door or calls residents or small businesses to enroll them into your community's natural gas and/or electric aggregation program.

If someone knocks on your door posing as a NOPEC employee, please try to obtain or take note of the following:

- a business card or company name
- solicitor's name & phone number
- copy of any paperwork/brochures they offer or provide
- vehicle information (make, color, plate number, etc.)

And remember, NEVER allow anyone into your home or share your utility bill account information with anyone that comes knocking on your door or makes unprompted contact.

### **Solicitation Ordinances:**

While on the topic of solicitors, the Codified Ordinances of Cuyahoga Heights provides protection for residents and businesses. The following are just a few of these laws:

### 852.02 HOURS OF SOLICITATION REGULATED.

• No solicitation shall be conducted before 9:00 a.m. or after 9:00 p.m. on weekdays, Saturdays and Sundays, or at any time on a state or national holiday.

### 852.03 NOTICE PROHIBITING SOLICITATION.

• Notice by the owner or occupant of any residence or place of business of the determination to refuse to receive any uninvited solicitors shall be given by displaying a weatherproof card, decal or sign, not less than two inches by three inches in size, nor more than one square foot in total surface area, upon or near the main entrance door to the residence or place of business, indicating such determination by the owner or occupant, containing the words "No Solicitors Invited", or words of similar import, with letters at least one-third of an inch in height.

**REMEMBER:** Immediately call the Cuyahoga Heights Police Department (216-883-6800) to report any un-invited door-to-door encounter.

The Building Department has performed all residential exterior maintenance inspections the past two weeks. Letters are currently being sent out if you have items that are violating our codified ordinances. If you have received a letter and have questions, please call the Building Department. Keep in mind that you may have a grant available.

The George M. Suhy grant program is good through Dec.31, 2022. When using the grant program, please remember to follow the guidelines and submit all your paperwork before the project is started. If you are not sure on how the program works, please call the Building Department and we will assist you with the proper paperwork.

With the nice weather finally here and your now able to coordinate your home improvement projects, remember to make sure your contractor is registered with the Village and proper permit paperwork is filled out with the Building Department.

### Village Wide Garage Sales

Our annual village wide garage sales will be held on Saturday, June 25 from 8:00 a.m. until 3:00 p.m. Village residents that are interested in participating must register by calling the village hall at 216-641-7020 during normal business hours. By registering your residence for the garage sale, you will receive one table which will be dropped off at your home earlier that week by our service department. Please be advised that there are not enough tables for more than one table per residence. We will be placing ads in the Neighborhood News and online to promote this event. The deadline to register is Thursday, June 9.

### Parks and Playgrounds

The village owns, operates, and maintains Bacci Park with a pond for fishing in the summer and ice-skating in the winter. Bacci Park also has its own playground, two ball fields, three pavilions, and a soccer field. \*Please note that fishing in the pond at Bacci Park is for residents only, and by permit which can be obtained from the Cuyahoga Heights Police Department.

### **Notary Service**

Several of our employees at the village hall are Notaries for the State of Ohio, Cuyahoga County and would be happy to notarize items for village residents, free of charge during regular business hours.

### **Medical Transports**

Our transportation program continues to be one of the most utilized services our village provides. This service is available for our senior citizens (60+) who are otherwise unable to get to their doctor appointments. If any senior citizen has a doctor's visit and in need of transportation, please contact Mindy Armbrust at 216-641-2702 during normal business hours-one week prior to the scheduled doctor's visit.

# Cedar Point

Cedar Point is currently offering a Summer Pass Option until May 31st for only \$99. The Cedar Point Summer Pass Option is valid for unlimited admission and free parking to Cedar Point on public operating days through Labor Day, September 5, 2022. (Additional pass options available)

Go to cedarpoint.com to get the latest Season Pass information and park hours.

The Village of Cuyahoga Heights will reimburse \$50 to any resident who purchases or has purchased a Cedar Point Season Pass for the 2022 season. Resident must show valid 2022 season pass and proof of residency for reimbursement. Reimbursement will NOT be given for anyone not currently residing in Cuyahoga Heights.

Please bring your valid 2022 season pass or receipt of payment (must show passholder name) and proof of residency to Village Hall for verification. Reimbursement will be issued within two weeks of submission acceptance. Reimbursement is \$50 per pass regardless of pass type purchased.

### Garbage Pick Up - Recycling - Yard Waste

The Village Service Department collects garbage every Monday morning beginning at 8:00 a.m. at no charge to its residents. Our Service Department will come into your yard and take your garbage tote and recycling container to the curb; afterwards they will carry it back into your yard. Please note that if a holiday falls on a Monday; the service will commence on Tuesday.

### Special Pick Up

If you need a special pick up for trash that is oversized, large amounts, or hazardous waste, don't forget to call the Service Department to be put on the special pick up list. Special pick up day is on Tuesday mornings, unless there is a holiday on Monday, at which time, the special pick up will be taken care of on Wednesday. You must call the Service Department at 216-641-3505 by 4:00 on Monday to get on the list for Tuesday's pick up.

### From the Service Department (continued)

### Charity Pick Up

Our Service Department will pick up any small usable items at your residence that you would like to donate to charity on the first Wednesday of each month. Small household items, clothes, etc., are collected and donated. No tax receipts are given for this service, and you must call the Service Department at 216-641-3505 prior to the first Wednesday of the month for this service.

### Newspaper/Cardboard Recycling

Do your part in helping the environment; recycle cardboard and newspaper. Our village has a recycling container which is located in Bacci Park in the rear of the back parking lot. The container is strictly for cardboard and newspaper. Please make sure to break down your cardboard boxes before placing them in the container. If you have a large amount and are unable to take it to the container, please call the Service Department during normal business hours prior to Tuesday mornings; we will put it on our "special pick up" list.

### Dumpsters

Residents may rent a village dumpster for personal use at their home by paying \$30.00 to the village for each dumpster load. Dumpsters can be used for yard waste, construction debris or miscellaneous household items NOT including carpet, tires, or hazardous waste. Please do not mix materials. Contact the Service Director at 216-641-3505 for this service. Use of the dumpster is for a maximum of two (2) weeks. After two (2) weeks, the dumpster will be picked up from the resident's home. If the resident needs to use it again, he/she will go back on the waiting list. Please note that the disposal of debris created from outside the village is prohibited.

### PEST AND INSECT CONTROL

Pest control services are available by contacting our Service Department at 216-641-3505 with your name, address, phone number, and the nature of your problem. We will then reach out to our pest control vendor. This service is free except for termites, bed bugs, and wildlife. The village also sprays the outside of your home in the spring to hinder any unwanted pests from entering into your home.

### Meals on Wheels (By Lori's Custom Catering)

This service is available to any village resident that is 60 years of age or older. A lunch time meal will be delivered to your home daily, Monday through Friday, by our Service Department. This is an affordable option, the cost is \$25.00 per week, which is only \$5.00 per day (must sign-up up for a full week.) To receive meals for a given week payment must be made by the Thursday prior. #### Table & Chair Rental

A limited number of tables and chairs are available for use by residents having parties at their residence, free of charge. Please contact the Service Department at 216-641-3505 to reserve your tables and chairs and to arrange a time when you can pick them up.

#### Tree Trimming/Removal Service

The village will provide a professional tree trimmer to remove or trim a tree on a resident's property. Please note that tree trimming/removal is limited to two (2) trims per year and one (1) removal. If a crane is needed for tree removal, it is the responsibility of the homeowner to pay for the service. In addition, if a stump needs ground, it is the responsibility of the homeowner to pay for the service, whether the homeowner uses the tree company that the village has a contract with or another tree company. Forms can be found on the village website and once completed can be returned to <u>SD@cuyahogaheights.com</u> or dropped off at the village hall.

### **Grass Cutting**

The village will cut the grass of each senior citizen's residence that is 60 years of age or older and that qualifies under the program. We must have a signed waiver on file to perform this service. Your form can be returned to the village hall. If you are unsure if you have a waiver on file, please contact the Service Department at 216-641-3505. Please remember to remove dog droppings on a routine basis.

### Rototilling

Our Service Department will rototill residential gardens once a year, free of charge, upon request. Area to be rototilled must be clearly marked. Please call the Service Department at 216-641-3505 to be put on the list.

### **Swimming Pool**

The swimming pool will officially open for the season on Saturday, June 4 at 12:00 p.m.; hours of operation are Monday through Sunday with open swim from 12:00-7:00 p.m. The cost for passes for village residents will be \$25 for an individual pass or \$75 for a family pass. We've included a flyer with this month's newsletter on when village residents can purchase pool passes and the availability of swim lessons.

#### **Concession Stand/Food Trucks**

The concession stand will be open for the summer from May 31 through September 5. Food trucks will be returning on Wednesday evenings—we've included information with this newsletter as it pertains to the trucks for the month of June. Please follow our social media accounts with updates.
