R.I.T.A.

Prior to the September 14th council meeting, Brian Thunberg, Government Liaison from the Regional Income Tax Agency presented our village with a Proclamation for being one of the 39 founding municipalities of the Regional Council of Governments and the Regional Income Tax Agency which was founded in 1971. It was created to foster cooperation between Ohio municipalities through the sharing of facilities, equipment, and costs for their common benefit, including the establishment of a central collection facility to administer the income tax laws of all Ohio municipal corporations participating in the Regional Council of Governments.

Cuyahoga Heights Schools

Cuyahoga Heights High School placed 20th out of 823 high schools in Ohio, and 5th in Cuyahoga County in terms of test scores according to the 2022 Ohio School Report Card. This includes both traditional public school districts and charter schools. Private schools do not receive Ohio School report cards. What an amazing accomplishment for the administration and staff at Cuyahoga Heights High School!

This past June, the District's Operations Challenge team competed at the Ohio Water Environment Association (OWEA) competition in Cleveland, Ohio, and their 2nd place finish guaranteed them a spot at the national competition in October in New Orleans. A Message from Your Police Department

The Cuyahoga Heights Police Department wants to remind local motorists of the increase in deer-related traffic crashes this time of year. According to the Ohio Department of Natural Resources (ODNR), deer become much more active during the fall breeding season which occurs from late October through November. During this period or "rut", males (bucks) pursue prospective female mates (does). During this "rut", bucks often chase does that are not yet willing to breed, which can result



in pursuits where deer will dart into roadways with little caution or regard for traffic. This action leads to an increase in deer-related vehicle accidents this time of year. Drivers are encouraged to be extra cautious in areas where wildlife habitat intersects with a roadway (i.e., fence rows, agriculture plots, areas of woodland or overgrown vegetation). Deer and other wildlife use these corridors and patches to traverse and travel through the landscape.

Tips to avoid deer collisions:

- Scan the road ahead: Looking ahead helps provide enough reaction time if an animal is spotted.

 Also, remember deer often move in groups. Where there is one, there is usually another (or more).
- Use high beam headlights (absent of oncoming traffic): This can help you spot deer and their reflective eyes more quickly. If you have time, honk your horn to warn and scare the animal away.
- Be extra cautious at dawn and dusk: Deer are usually more active in the early morning and at dusk.
- If a collision is unavoidable, apply the brakes firmly and remain in your lane: Do not swerve to avoid! Swerving can often cause a more serious crash or cause you to lose control of your vehicle. Drivers who swerve to miss a deer and hit something else may be considered "at-fault".
- Always wear a seatbelt and remain awake, alert, and sober: If you're impaired, distracted or drowsy, you could end up spotting them too late to avoid a collision.

What to do if you hit a deer:

- Call the police.
- Activate the vehicle's hazard lights whether it's light or dark outside.
- If possible, move the vehicle to a safe location out of the roadway, and wait for help to arrive.
- Avoid physical contact with the deer/animal. A frightened and wounded animal can be dangerous and pose
 a threat when approached or could further injure itself.
- Drivers should contact their insurance agent or company representative as quickly as possible to report any vehicle damage.

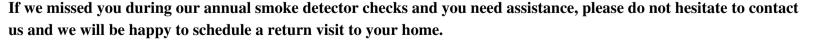

WE WOULD LIKE TO WISH EVERYONE A SAFE AND HAPPY HALLOWEEN.

- S Swords, knives, and other costume accessories should be short, soft, and flexible.
- A_Avoid trick-or-treating alone. Walk in groups or with a trusted adult.
- F Fasten reflective tape to costumes and bags to help drivers see you.
- E Examine all treats for choking hazards and tampering before eating them. Limit the amount of treats you eat.
- H Hold a flashlight while trick-or-treating to help you see and others see you. WALK and don't run from house to house.
- A Always test makeup in a small area first. Remove it before bedtime to prevent possible skin and eye irritation.
- L Look both ways before crossing the street. Use crosswalks wherever possible.
- L Lower your risk for serious eye injury by not wearing decorative contact lenses.
- O Only walk on sidewalks whenever possible, or on the far edge of the road facing traffic to stay safe.
- W Wear well-fitting masks, costumes, and shoes to avoid blocked vision, trips, and falls.
- **E** Eat only factory wrapped treats. Avoid eating homemade treats made by strangers.
- E Enter homes only if you are with a trusted adult. Only visit well lit houses. Never accept rides from strangers.
 - N Never walk near open flames. Be sure to wear flame resistant costumes.

Fall Interior Maintenance Tips:

- Change filters throughout your home such as in your furnace, air conditioner, stove vent, dryer and fans.
- Check faucets in the bathrooms, kitchens and laundry room for leaks and other repair needs. It is best to make faucet repairs now before winter, you may be able to avoid a more complicated repair if the pipe freezes and breaks.
- If you have a fireplace, examine it thoroughly. Ensure the damper is open to allow air to flow freely and check the handles and springs to make sure the flue is operating correctly. If used regularly, the chimney should be professionally inspected and cleaned.
- Drain and inspect the hot water tank for rust developing in the tank. If the tank is older and/or rusting, it may be a good time to buy a newer more energy efficient and cost effective one.
- Check windows and doors to ensure the seal and caulk are in good condition.
- Check all your smoke detectors, make sure they are all working properly. All bedrooms and every floor of your home should have a smoke detector.

DID YOU KNOW:

Minimum area:

Habitable rooms shall have a floor area of not less than 70 square feet and shall not be less than 7 feet in any horizontal dimension.

From your Service Department

Garbage Pick Up - Recycling - Yard Waste

Our service department collects garbage every Monday morning beginning at 8:00 a.m. at no charge to its residents. They will come into your yard and take your garbage tote and recycling container to the curb; afterwards they will carry it back into your yard. Please note that if a holiday falls on a Monday; the service will commence on Tuesday.

Special Pick Up

If you need a special pick up for trash that is oversized, large amounts, or hazardous waste, don't forget to call the service department to be put on the special pick up list. Special pick up day is on Tuesday mornings, unless there is a holiday on Monday, at which time, the special pick up will be taken care of on Wednesday. You must call the service department at 216-641-3505 by 4:00 p.m. on Monday to get on the list for Tuesday's pick up.

Charity Pick Up

Our service department will pick up any small usable item at your residence that you would like to donate to charity on the first Wednesday of each month. Small household items, clothes, etc., are collected and donated. No tax receipts are given for this service, and you must call the service department at 216-641-3505 prior to the first Wednesday of the month for this service.

Newspaper/Cardboard Recycling

Do your part in helping the environment; recycle cardboard and newspaper. Our village has a recycling container located at Bacci Park in the rear of the back parking lot. The container is strictly for cardboard and newspaper. Please make sure to break down your cardboard boxes before placing them in the container. Stop on down and do your part in recycling. If you have a large amount and are unable to take it to the container, please call the service department during normal business hours prior to Tuesday mornings; we will put it on our "special pick up" list.

Dumpsters

Residents may rent a village dumpster for personal use at their home by paying \$30.00 to the village for each dumpster load. Dumpsters can be used for yard waste, construction debris or miscellaneous household items NOT including carpet, tires, or hazardous waste. Please do not mix materials. Contact the service director at 216-641-3505 for this service. Use of the dumpster is for a maximum of two (2) weeks. After two (2) weeks, the dumpster will be picked up from the resident's home. If the resident needs to use it again, he/she will go back on the waiting list. Please note that the disposal of debris created from outside the village is prohibited.

Table & Chair Rental

A limited number of tables and chairs are available for use by residents having parties at their residence, free of charge. Please contact the service department at 216-641-3505 to reserve your tables and chairs and to arrange a time when you can pick them up.

Pest and Insect Control

Pest control services are available by contacting our service department at 216-641-3505 with your name, address, phone number, and the nature of your problem. We will then reach out to our pest control vendor. This service is free except for termites, bed bugs, and wildlife. The village also sprays the outside of your home in the spring to hinder any unwanted pests from entering into your home.

Meals on Wheels (By Lori's Custom Catering)

This service is available to any village resident that is 60 years of age or older. A lunch time meal will be delivered to your home daily, Monday through Friday, by our service department. This is an affordable option, the cost is \$25.00 per week, which is only \$5.00 per day (you must sign-up up for a full week.) To receive meals for a given week, payment must be made by the Thursday prior. Leaf Pick Up

Fall is upon us, and the beautiful colored leaves will soon be crunching under our feet. We would like to remind our residents to rake their leaves to the tree lawn; our service department will then dispose of them for you.



Snow Removal Program *Residential Snow Removal Program

- All village roadways will be plowed first and maintained prior to any driveways being plowed.
- Once the Service Director feels that the roadways and municipal buildings have been maintained, the driveways of our senior citizens will be plowed (using the same criteria that applies to our grass cutting service).
- Afterwards, taking into consideration manpower, time and safety issues, the village will help residents with their driveways in the event of a storm that produces more than 2-4 inches of snow at the resident's request.
- All residents must have driveway markers in place in order to allow the service department to plow their driveway. The village will provide markers and place them for all seniors who qualify for the "grass cutting program."







From your Service Department (continued)

Residents with shorter driveways need 4 markers in place, and long driveways must have 6 markers. They need to be placed at the beginning, middle (if long drive), and at the end of your drive. If you wish to purchase markers from the village for \$1 each, please stop at the service department. Should you have any questions please contact Service Director, Dave Sammons at 216-641-3505.

• Please note that residents are responsible for cleaning their driveway aprons, as it is difficult to plow them over again after the streets are plowed. Each homeowner and/or resident must have a waiver of liability on file at our service department.

If you already have filled out a waiver of liability and there have been no changes to it, there will be no need to fill out a new one. If you are unsure if you have one on file, please contact Vera Heinzman at 216-641-3505 or sd@cuyahogaheights.com.
